James A. Conrad Dies At Sussex, N. B.

There will be relatives and many friends on Prince Edward Island who will learn with regret of the death of James Albert Conrad, manager of the Sussex Cheese and Butter Company which occurred Tuesday night in the Kings County Memorial Hospital, Sussex, where he had been a patient for two weeks. He had been in failing health for some time. He was a native of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Conrad had been a resident of Sussex since 1904 when he came here to take a course in butter-making at the provincial dairy school. He remained as an instructor in the school and in 1907 joined the staff of the Sussex Cheese and Butter Company as a butter-maker. He later held the position of foreman and since 1940 had been manager of the company.

It was in a large measure due to Mr. Conrad's initiative and management that the Sussex firm reached a high state of efficiency and captured many prizes in butter competitions. He was a member of the national Dairy Council and made many trips to Ottawa in connection with that organization.

Mr. Conrad was an active member of the United Baptist Church and in his earlier years he served on various boards as deacon and trustee. He was for many years treasurer of the Sunday School. He was a member of the Orange Order. In municipal affairs he served as a member of the town council for a time and was deeply interested in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the community.

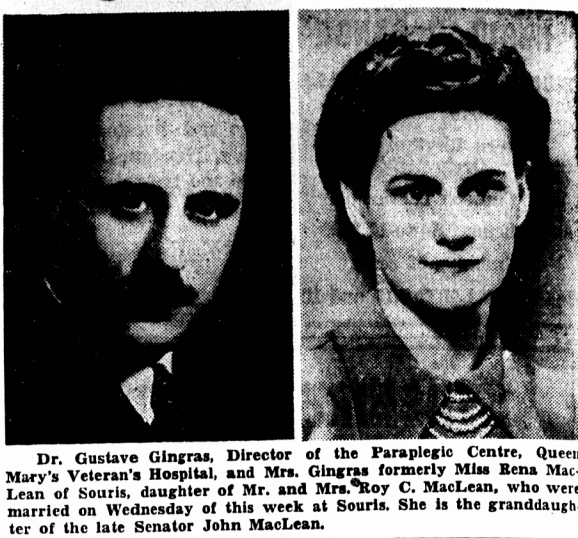
