It is expected that repairs to the Duchesse will be completed about the 10th October. The damages will amount to \$5000, the propeller alone, which was made of brass, being valued at \$3000. The accident occurred when the steamer was off Egg Island, about 40 miles from Halifax, and as the propeller sank in 300 feet of water, its recovery is out of the question. The Duchesse will run this winter between New York and Savannah.

On Saturday last pupils of the public school at Grand Tracadie, Charles McDonald, master, had an afternoon of fun which was provided by four ladies, from the United States, who are summering at John W. McDonald's at the cross roads. The games of many sorts were enjoyed by enthusiastic shout and laughter, constant and hearty. The little schoolhouse was decorated with overgreen boughs, ferns, and flowers, a fish net serving to cover the side wall back of the master's desk. Into the meshes of this net ferns were woven, while heavy rope and its floats were fastened above windows, and along the other side walls. Flowers and greens formed a bank upon the master's plat form. Outside of the schoolhouse photographs were taken of the fifty-two children who were in attendance; and, immediately previous to the closing game, one of the ladies gave a three minute talk to the children; asking them to remember three things:—to love their flag and ever be true to it; to make the most of opportunity, no matter how small; and to cultivate love of the gifts of nature. Arousing three cheers for the foreign ladies followed, after which one of the patrons of the school suggested that the first verse of "America" would be sung. This courtesy was recognized by the foreigners with a response that the first verse of "God save the Queen" would be included in the singing. A game outside upon the grass followed and in this every child, and the neighbors, and visitors joined, at the close of which one of the school boys called for three cheers for the Stars and Stripes. Thus ended an afternoon of frolic the like of which these children had never seen, for it was heard on every side. "We had a good time; it couldn't be better." A note to be forgotten feature was the master's share in the affair, for he brought a large box of candy which he distributed to each of his scholars.
