

United Church  
Presbytery Meeting

A largely attended meeting of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held in Hertz Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, May 4th, with the Rev. A. S. Weir, B. A., of Vernon in the chair.

The sincere sympathy of the court was expressed to the Rev. T. A. Wilson, B.Sc., of Covehead, in the recent passing of his wife, and to the family of the late Mr. Hugh McLure of Bradalbane, a valued member of the Presbytery and for years clerk of the session of that congregation both before and since union.

Calls concurred in were the following: Rev. Thomas Falchthorpe from Winsloe to the Upper London-derry Charge; Rev. Ralph Barker, M. A., from Stanley, N. B., to Be-deque; Rev. J. R. Skinner from Belle River-Belfast to Winsloe; Rev. Arthur Organ, B. D., from Be-deque to Centenary Church, Saint John.

The resignation of the Rev. E. R. Wodside, B. A., from Richmond Bay East was passed on to the Se-cument Committee. Permission was granted to the Rev. Arthur H. Long to withdraw his resignation from the Montague Charge.

Committees were appointed to make arrangements for the licen-ting to preach of Mr. Roy E. Wel-ster, B. A. of Marie, and Mr. Gar-land C. Brooks, M. A., of O'Leary at their home congregations. Mr. J. Austin Jardine, B. A., of Willmot Valley will be licensed to preach at conference.

The following chairmen of com-mittees were named: Christian Ed-ucation, Rev. A. J. Ebbutt, B. D., of Valleyfield; Evangelism and Social Service, Rev. F. M. Young, M. A., of Tryon; Foreign Missions, Rev. L. E. Davies of Summerside; Home Missions, Rev. M. K. Charman of Alberton; Pensions, Rev. W. A. Mac-quarrie, B. D., of Hunter River; Publications, Rev. D. J. Morrison of Hampton; Archives, Rev. J. M. MacLeod, M. A., of Charlottetown; Church Property, Rev. B. C. Salter, B. A., of Kensington; Statistics, Rev. L. W. Parker of West Cape; Settle-ment, Rev. W. A. Macquarrie, B. D., of Hunter River and Rev. J. G. Hockin, B. A., of Souris.

Education of Students: Rev. John Stirling, B. A., of Georgetown. The Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson, M. A., of Be-deque North was nominated for President of the Maritime Confer-ence. The Rev. Sidney J. Boyce, B. A., of Mount Stewart, was appoint-ed to follow the Rev. A. S. Weir, B. A. as chairman of the Presby-tery for the year commencing July 1st next.

Announcements were made of two important events in the early summer—a Coaching Conference for Sunday School Workers in Charlottetown on June 9th and the Annual Boys' Camp at Canoe Cove for boys between 11 and 17 from July 5th-10th under the leadership of Mr. Ralph Young, Boys' Work Secretary.

The congregations were asked to hold special Coronation Services on May 12th, where practicable. A resolution was passed express-ing appreciation of the promise of the Premier for a better enforce-ment of the Prohibition Law. The Presbytery adjourned to meet during the Sackville Conference which convenes on June 1st.

Dirigible  
Disasters

WASHINGTON, May 8 —There have been 18 major dirigible disasters in the last 23 years—three of the major ones involving the United States dirigibles Akron, Macon and Shenandoah.

THE DISASTER LIST

Feb. 12, 1935—The navy dirigible Macon destroyed off the Pacific coast, two died, 81 saved.

April 4, 1933—United States navy dirigible Akron crashed in electrical storm off New Jersey coast, 73 dead, three survivors.

Oct. 4, 1930—British dirigible R-101 exploded over France while en route from England to India, 48 dead.

May 25, 1928—Italian dirigible Italia crashed in Arctic in flight to North Pole; eight dead.

Sept. 3, 1925—United States dirigible Shenandoah, formerly ZR-1, wrecked in storm in Ohio; 14 killed.

Dec. 21, 1923—French dirigible Dixmude, presumably struck by lightning over Mediterranean; 52 killed.

Feb. 21, 1922—United States dirigible Rome, bought by United States from Italy, crashed in flames near Hampton Roads army base; 34 killed.

Aug. 24, 1921—British dirigible R-34, wrecked in gale in Howden, England; no lives lost.

July 21, 1919—Dirigible burned over Chicago; 16 killed.

July 15, 1918—British airship NS-11 struck by lightning over North Sea; 12 killed.

June 20, 1914—Airship and air-plane collided at Vienna; 9 killed.

Sept. 9, 1913—Zeppelin L-1 destroyed over Helgoland; 15 killed.

Oct. 17, 1913—Zeppelin L-2 exploded over Johannisthal airfield; 28 killed.

July 2, 1912—Balloon Akron exploded at Atlantic City; 5 killed.

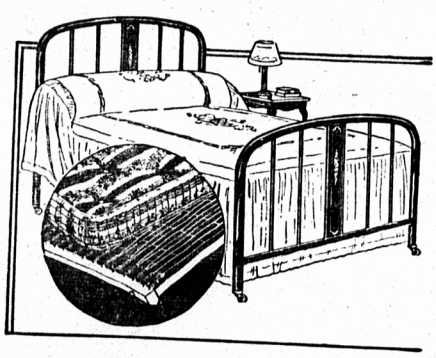
Besides the Zeppelins L-1 and L-2, Count Zeppelin lost four other great peace-time dirigibles in accidents, the Zeppelins 3 and 6 and the Deutschlands 1 and 2.
