### CAMBRIDGE, Mass., November 28

—Miss Hattie LeBlanc, charged with the murder of Clarence F. Glover, the Waltham laundryman, a little more than a year ago was put on trial today.

No evidence was offered in court today, but the jury was taken out to Waltham, where the twelve men filed silently through the laundry where Glover said he was shot, then up to the little cottage hospital, to which he dragged himself for aid and to die. Then the jury went to the Glover home, where Hattie LeBlanc was a servant and where she was found three days after the murder, hiding under a bed. It was only a few miles out to Waltham, but as the jury box was not filled until after noon, Judge Bond decided to postpone the government opening until tomorrow.

The jury is made up of Middlesex county farmers and clerks and businessmen and the twelve men were selected with very little trouble. A long trial stoutly contested on both sides is anticipated. Upon their return from Waltham the jurymen were earnestly instructed by the court to guard themselves carefully against sickness and to keep free from outside influences during the progress of the case.

Court will come in at nine o'clock tomorrow morning and the first business will be a hearing on a motion of Counsel Johnson of the defense that the government be restricted from mentioning the alleged dying statement of Clarence F. Glover, in the opening for the prosecution.
