ENJOYABLE EVENT.—At Mr. George B. McNutt's, in Burnley, a very attractive social is to be held on Wednesday evening of this week, when it is expected that a branch of the Red Cross Society will be formed.

RED CROSS MEETING.—A very enthusiastic meeting of the Red Cross Society was held in Rustico Hall on Tuesday evening, September 1st. Mr. Joseph J. Doucette was chosen chairman and the first speaker to address the meeting was His Honor Judge Haszard. He spoke briefly upon the purpose of the meeting and explained fully the objects of the Red Cross Society. He said that it was the duty of each member of the British Empire to do all he could to uphold that Empire and the least that we Islanders could do would be to help in some measure to alleviate the almost unimaginable sufferings of the brave soldiers who were fighting to maintain the position and liberty of the British Empire and who were therefore fighting for our own liberty, for the downfall of the Empire would mean our own downfall. Mr. Haszard was followed by Sir Louis Davies, who made a very energetic and patriotic speech. He dealt in general terms about the present war, its probable but also its possible results; he depicted also the horrors of war, especially of a war of modern times, in a way that touched the hearts of all present. He urged the people to do all they could to lessen these horrors as much as possible. Rev. Dr. Chalmers, J. H. Runtain, M.L.A., and Thomas Doyle followed with brief speeches, each speaker endorsing his appreciation of the good work in which the Society was engaged, and expressing the hope it might be supported by generous contributions from the people of Rustico and adjoining sections. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem. After the meeting the ladies convened and organized a branch of the Red Cross Society. Mrs. Bradford W. LePAGE was appointed President; Mrs. Dr. McKenna, Secretary; and Mrs. Cornelius Doucette, Treasurer. Committees of ladies from adjoining sections were also appointed to manage the work in their own particular districts. It is to be hoped that they may meet much success in their undertaking.—Z
