**A QUIET MONTH**—City Police had a quiet month in February, it was revealed when the report of Chief A. Birtwistle was presented to the City Council here. Arrests during the month totaled 23. Chief said. Drunks led the list with 14 while vagrants were second with six. Fines and costs collected during the month totaled \$90, there were no fines collected under the Prohibition Act, the Chief revealed.

**BY LAW PASSED**—An emergency session of the Charlottetown City Council was held at 12:30 yesterday for the purpose of giving the third reading of the bill to amend the Insolvency Act. The bill was passed by a vote of the Council. Mayor E. Roy Holman presided and there were present Councilors, Stewart, Blain, MacDonnell, Butler, McKee and LeBlond.

**C. N. R. TRUCKS ARRIVE**—Five motor trucks, the property of the Canadian National and which arrived in the City yesterday. It is understood that they will be used as a pickup and delivery vehicle for the trucks at the four-ton capacity and bear the Canadian National sign on the hood. The make of the new vehicles include one each of the following: Ford, Dodge, General Motors, International and Chevrolet. Citizens had their first glimpse of the machines when at least one was seen uptown in the City yesterday.

**SECOND FLIGHT CANCELLED**—Pilot Joe Anderson took off from the river ice yesterday morning with a Canadian Airways plane flying two passengers and 600 pounds of mail for the Magdalen Islands. One passenger was carried on the return trip. The round trip was made in 10 1/2 hours. A second trip which was scheduled for the 11th of March was cancelled due to unfavorable weather. Two trips to the Magdalen Islands will be made if weather conditions are favorable. It was announced last night that other flights were carried out on schedule yesterday.

**ARTILERY ENTERTAINED**—Through the good offices of the Canadian Legion the members of the Artillery C.A.S.F., stationed at Beach Grove Inn, enjoyed another concert Monday night. Arthur Bruce, Chairman of the Legion Entertainment Committee, presided and announced the several numbers. Selections by the Artillery Orchestra were greatly appreciated as were readings and group singing by the boys in uniform. The readings by G. W. Charles McKinnis being particularly interesting. Vocal solos by "Earle" took the house by storm and was commended to good naturedly respond to encores. None the least interesting was a song conducted by Albert Dennis with Albert Blanchard at the piano.

**BETTER SILVERS 25% HIGHER**—Full silver of the National Fox and Fur Breeders Association reached a top price of \$180 at the sale conducted last Wednesday by Tompson, Fraser & Hutch, Inc. Skins selling above \$25 showed an advance of 25 per cent, while those selling under that figure rose 10 per cent. Eighty-eight per cent of the offering was sold. A silver fox skin, donated by Felix Kohn, assistant manager of the auction company, brought a total of \$285 for the Finnish Relief Fund. The skin was bought and returned by the auction company, the American National, R. W. Fraser, J.M. Bossak, G. Meyers, and was finally bought by a representative of the Fur Trade Review.

**ICE DELAYS TRAFFIC**—The train with mails and passengers from the mainland was more than two hours late reaching Charlottetown last night. Most of the delay was due to ice conditions in Northumberland Strait, it was learned from Canadian National railway officials. Ice conditions between Borden and Tormentine were becoming increasingly heavy during the day, it was learned. The ferry lost one hour on the morning crossing but tonight the ice had piled in against the New Brunswick shore by increasing winds from the north and the powerful icebreaker had heavy work to do for several miles. The boat took two hours over the regular time in making the crossing from the mainland to the island terminal last night. Canadian Airways planes ran on regular schedule.

Dealing specifically with Mr. Howe's radio address from Ottawa Saturday night, Dr. Manion denied a minister's statement that the Defence of Canada Regulations constituted the only restriction on campaign speeches. Dr. Manion said the broadcasting of political meetings had been banned.

As to Mr. Howe's suggestion that Dr. Manion was "trying to bribe the people with their own money," in proposing abolition of the radio licence fees, Dr. Manion retorted the government was "taking the people's money and only bribing their own party," looking after their own party. Mr. Howe's address was "an even mixture of falsehood and abuse," on a par with the speeches of "little Mr. Rogers."

Dr. Manion proposed more labor representatives on war boards and appointment of a labor man to administer the Labor Department. There was no new industrialist in the whole cabinet. He felt more diversified representation in the cabinet was essential. Of the 15 ministers, 10 were lawyers.

"I've nothing against lawyers, but they're just not good enough to run a cabinet," he said.

"Therefore, as a Canadian who puts love of country before political party, I have filed my nomination papers and I will contest this election as a Liberal who believes in and supports the National Government policy of the United Kingdom and the party led by Hon. R. J. Manion.

"In my opinion, Canada needs a National Government. In that way and only in that way can we efficiently prosecute our war effort. Therefore, for the duration of the war, I will support the policy of National Government and upon that basis I will call upon the electors of Antigonish-Guysboro to send me to the House of Commons to further Canadian unity and our war effort under a truly National Government headed by Dr. R. J. Manion."

fore taking action: First, what effect will this have on the Liberal Party? and second, what effect will this have on my Liberal supporters in the province of Quebec," Dr. MacMillan charged.

"The King is presenting national unity as the first duty of Canadians," he said.

"The first duty of Canadians should be to win the war," he continued.

"Political patronage has never been so rampant in this country as it is at present," he charged.

He pointed out that the war effort was costing a million dollars a day and cited irregularities in the operations of the War Supply Board.

Dr. MacMillan scored the lack of preparedness for the present conflict due to the negligence of the Liberal Government.

**Radical Censorship**

He denounced the present method of censoring imposed by the King Government on radio speeches. This "strangling of speakers" by the King Government was an imitation of Hitler's methods," Dr. Manion was not allowed to have his speech in Charlottetown broadcast because of a law passed by Mackenzie King prohibiting the broadcasting of public meetings in the campaign.

Mr. King was sitting at Ottawa and refused to travel across the country to discuss the questions of the day. King preferred to use the radio, he declared.

He cited the large number of lawyers in the King cabinet, eleven in all, and said that they had even placed a lawyer in the portfolio of Minister of Pensions and National Health.

In his concluding remarks, Dr. MacMillan reviewed the evidence of Mackenzie King's refusal to allow Great Britain to establish an air training scheme in Canada two years ago.

**Seal Hunt Opens Off Nfld. Coast**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 12—(CP Cable)—Killing of seals has started in the waters north of Newfoundland and with seven steamers from this colony pursuing the ancient hunt for pelts.

First ship to report finding seals since the season opened over the weekend was the veteran Ranger. She killed 3,000 yesterday.

Because of lack of ice floes along the Newfoundland coast, the fleet was believed to have gone further north than usual this season.
