SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

AENEAS AND DORCAS.

Acts 9:32-43.

Sunday School Lesson April 9, 1916.

GOLDEN TEST.—"In all things showing thyself a pattern of good works."—Titus 2:7.

It is heartening to see how ardent for the prize of their high calling. In the early Christians were to seize upon opportunities. Over and over, as soon as precautions relaxed a little, they sprang forward at once on the gospel charge. They must have known that this would only bring fresh persecution. The memory of the last attack of their enemies was very bitter. But forgetting the things behind, they pressed toward the mark for the prize of a high calling. In this they were a glorious example for modern Christians who have no persecution to fear and can preach Christ every day all their lives if they choose to.

We might have been sure that Peter would be one to take advantage of such an opportunity as was afforded by the conversion of Saul, the persecutor. Peter had received from his Lord a personal commission. He was eager to redeem himself for his sad denial. He "went throughout all parts" with the good news of the risen Christ. Jerusalem could not contain him, all Galilee could not contain him. When a man once catches them missionary vision his life is inevitably widened. He may have been a fisherman on the Sea of Genesareth; henceforth he fishes in every ocean.

Pete went to the saints as well as to the sinners. He ministered to believers as well as to unbelievers, to Aeneas and Dorcas, as well as to Cornelius. Some ministers take thought for the wide concerns of sociology and political economy more than for the happiness and growth of their own church members. Some church members care more for outsiders than for their fellow members over whose interests they promise to watch when they joined the Church. This one is to be done, and the other not to be left undone.

If Peter had said to Aeneas, as a quack would have said, "Be of good cheer, I will heal thee," it would have required no faith, nothing but brazen effrontery. But to say, as Peter did, "Jesus Christ healeth thee; arise," called for faith of the highest order. Only a heart very close to the Master's days say what Christ will or will not do. Peter had walked with Christ through three crowded years, and he was so familiar with his ways that he could predict them with confidence. We can get the same happy power of prediction, but only on the same terms.

The result of the healing of Aeneas was that all Lydda and the plain of Sharon turned to the Lord. Nothing draws men like benefits. Men may be terrified into conversion, but they are far more likely to be attracted into conversion. Ministers used to wear stannets of the horrors of hell, and that was well; we could stand more of that kind of preaching today than we are getting; but the preaching of these times, painting the love of the Redeemer, the joys of the redeemed life, and the eternal bliss of heaven, is on the whole far more effective.





It is based on the assumption that this is the only world in which Dorcas can be utilized, that God cannot have a wise use for Dorcas in heaven.
