THE GUARDIAN regrets to learn of the death at Montague on Monday night of Dr. A. E. Gordon, of Ashmont, Mass. who practised at 905 Washington St. opposite Columbia Theatre, Boston, for ten years. Dr. Gordon was born at Commercial Cross P. E. Island. He graduated from the Boston Dental College in 1887. He had survived a severe attack of pneumonia, when he became severely troubled with heart disease, and has been in declining health for four months. Dr. Gordon came to his former home, hoping the change might prove a benefit. He was a member of I. O. O. F., N. E. O. P. and several other societies. He leaves a mother, a sorrowing wife and one son to lament the irreparable loss of a devoted son and an estimable husband and father. Dr. Gordon was a man of exceptional abilities, and of strong character, earnest unassuming in his ways and ever putting into action his noble ideas. The funeral will be conducted under the auspices of the I. O. O. F. to Lower Montague, on Friday.

A Toronto despatch of the 15th says Two hundred, or thereabouts, members of the headquarters staff of the Independent Order of Foresters and their friends left today for home, after enjoying the hospitality of Dr. Oronhyatekha at his beautiful summer home here. The party came down by a special train on Saturday, and since then have fairly revelled in pleasure. His own residence is a model of design and comfort, and there is at present under construction a veritable palace, which will be occupied when finished by the doctor. The site that has been chosen commands a beautiful view of the bay, and when completed the house will be one of the finest summer residences to be found anywhere. Dr. Oronhyatekha's guests were met at the landing by his steam yacht and conveyed to the island, where they were soon made welcome. From then on the stay was one continual round of pleasures. On Saturday evening a dance was held in the spacious pavilion for those who enjoyed that kind of recreation, and others again experienced the delights of boating. In fact, there was amusement in abundance for everyone, and there was not a slow moment during the entire stay. The only regret was that the visit was far too short. The Doctor has received an invitation from the High Court of Prince Edward Island to a mammoth demonstration to be held there on August 9th. Elaborate preparations are being made and much good is expected to result from it.
