### BRITISH FLEET WILL BACK UP DEMANDS

The Sultan Must Withdraw Troops From Egyptian Soil or Stern Measures Will Follow—France and Russia Support England in Her Demands.

LONDON, May 8.—The presentation of what is tantamount to an ultimatum to Turkey and the preparation of the British Mediterranean fleet for a demonstration in Turkish waters in the event of non-compliance, is expected to produce a speedy yielding on the part of the sultan and the settlement by the withdrawal of small Turkish garrisons pending delimitation of the rival frontier claims in the Sinai peninsula, which were left somewhat doubtful in the previous negotiations.

The sultan possibly may hold out longer in the hope that Great Britain will be reluctant to open delicate questions involving the forcing of the Dardanelles in order to make a demonstration before Constantinople; but seeing that none of the powers are inclined to support Turkey in her present attitude, this is considered unlikely.

#### ULTIMATUM PRESENTED.

The British Ambassador at Constantinople, Sir Nicholas R. O'Connor, yesterday, presented a note to Turkey demanding the prompt withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Egyptian territory. The note is practically an ultimatum and constitutes Great Britain's last word on the encroachment of Turkey on the

Sinai peninsula. The French and Russian ambassadors at Constantinople are supporting the British contention. Should the ultimatum fail to have the desired effect the British Mediterranean fleet will take the measure so often employed by the powers in recent years as the result of dispute with the Sultan and a naval demonstration, it is anticipated, will quickly bring out the evacuation of the Tabah territory.

The Sultan was given ten days in which to comply with the British demand for the withdrawal of his troops from Tabah and other points on Sinai peninsula pending the determination of the frontier by a commission.

A cabinet council was held to discuss the eventualities which possibly may arise as a result of the ultimatum.

#### BRITISH SQUADRON SAILS.

MALTA, May 8.—The British cruisers Carnarvon, Barham, Suffolk and Venus, and the special torpedo boat Vulcan with destroyers have gone to Piræus. The battleships Formidable, flagship of Vice-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, the battleship Irresistible and the cruiser Levlathan, have arrived here from a cruise.

### DAY AND NIGHT BANKS POPULAR

New York, May 9.—Ordinary banks closest 3 o'clock in the afternoon but lately at 6 o'clock were opened were to be closed at any hour of a legal banking day or night. It is called the Night and Day Bank and its situation is the ground floor of the marble building Fifth avenue and Forty-fourth street.

To provide for a service, banking and safe deposit, which shall be continuous there will be three shifts of clerks and tellers changing every eight hours.

Already the Night and Day Bank has several physicians as depositors. If called some distance out of the city on consultation they want, they say, a place to go for cash for the journey. One man not a physician became a depositor because he wanted a special train from the Grand Central station the other night and was delayed under the rule that a special train must be held for cash down and there was no way of getting the money at 2 o'clock in the morning. Another man, starting yesterday afternoon for Boston said:

"Here's \$1,000 for the reason that I'll return after regular banking hours tomorrow, will need some money, yet don't want to carry it about with me." Railroads have put on flyers and men have paid bonuses to get to New York from different cities "before the banks close. Hotels will be relieved of the need of pointing to the sign, "No checks cashed," and patrons will be under no necessity of saying, "What am I going to do? All banks are closed." Travellers will be able to cash drafts at any hour and proceed on their journey. A visitors' money order has been invented, which is payable on demand at any hour, "without personal identification."

### FIFTY MILLION IN GOLD

MEXICO CITY, May 9.—The imports for the first half of the current fiscal year amount in standard Mexican currency to \$86,703,214, showing a net decrease of \$1,500,751 over the corresponding period of the previous year. Exports for the same time amounted to \$131,984,507, showing a net increase of \$37,025,294 or nearly 40 per cent. There was heavy increase in gold and silver and vegetable exports. The local branch of the Bank of Montreal opened for business yesterday, Manager Stewart having arrived from Canada. It is estimated that the Canadian investment here is now close to fifty million dollars gold.

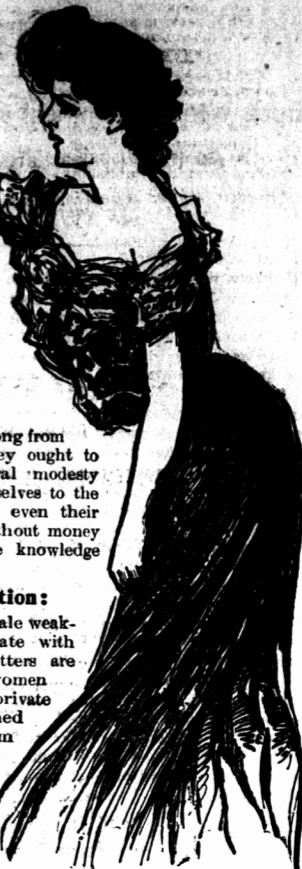
