Britain Loans Greece 20 Million

LONDON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The Foreign Office confirmed today that Britain has loaned Greece £5,000,000 (\$20,000,000), but rejected suggestions that the loan was designed to strengthen Premier Constantinos Tsakalof's hand in the Greek Cabinet crisis.
Asked in Athens Saturday whether the loan constituted British endorsement of his regime, Tsakalof said "you may form your own conclusion."
A former Office spokesman said the purpose of the loan was to help the Greek nation and added "you might as well suggest that the purpose of the American loan to Britain was to help Mr. Attlee." British Prime Minister.

HELPFUL NEW DRUGS FROM MILK SUGAR

In the 12 months ended March 31, 1946, about 1,500 farmers in Ontario and Quebec provided 88 million pounds of whey from which 800 tons of milk sugar were obtained practically all used in the manufacture of penicillin and 1,700 tons of whey powder used in the preparation of poultry and live-stock feeds. It is estimated that the farmers received \$125,000 from the sale of the whey. Because of the strict hygienic requirements of whey

HUGE WATER PROJECT FOR INDIAN RESERVE
KARACHI, India, Jan. 21 (CP)—The province of Sind, which already boasts the largest irrigation system in the world—the Lloyd Barrage and canal at Sukkur—is to construct another dam.

More than \$6,000,000 worth of machinery is on order from the United Kingdom and the United States. British and American experts have been engaged to train staff and to erect the plants. It is proposed to construct a dam across the River Indus in order to ensure an adequate water supply to Lower Sind, now dependent upon inundated canals.

When completed the project is expected to convert Lower Sind into the granary of the entire province, raising the area under rice cultivation from 450,000 acres to 1,700,000 acres. The scheme is expected to cost \$60,000,000.

LONDON, Jan. 21 (CP)—London and other large British cities are planning celebrations, probably in early May, to mark the return of the royal family from their tour of South Africa, and Princess Elizabeth's 21st birthday April 21. They are due to leave Cape Town April 24.

COMBINE-THERESHER STRAW
Heavy straw left by the combine-threshers has up to the present been commonly disposed of by burning. While this practice may facilitate the preparation of land for a succeeding crop, it causes the Dominion Experimental Farm, Brandon, Manitoba, it is contrary to all principles of soil conservation and should be discouraged at all times. Few weed seeds are destroyed by burning and fields thus denuded of cover in the autumn are subject to drifting and drying out during the winter and early spring. If burning must be done, it should be delayed until just before seeding time.
