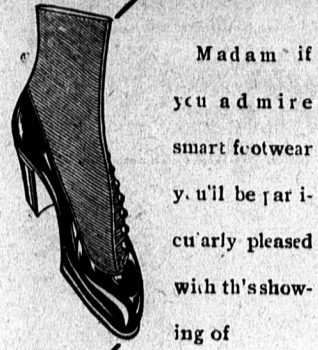

## A VACATION ON PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Sir—Prince Edward Island, who has ever visited her shores and gone away without that "Come Again" feeling? Home of my ancestry here where I found the little woman who has shared with me the sunshine and shadow of nearly thirty years and then when our union that had been blessed by five children was broken we laid our loved one to rest in the little cemetery at Victoria near where the winds sob and murmur and the sea birds fly to and fro like the flowers bloom with sweetest fragrance. For a number of years I have engaged my vacation on the Island but this year has been the climax. Last winter I had Mr. Willard Leard of Cape Traverse build me a sea going launch a piece of marine workmanship that has met the admiration of all lovers of sea going craft. A spacious cabin with a roomy deck and a fast boat with all the comforts of home. The power (and I might say the glory too) was not of an "importation" but an "Imperial" one of the best product of Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co. How we will miss the song of that engine as we return to take up our work again. Her noise was never out of tune. Started on the right key she sang for miles and miles as she thrashed the waters of the Straits with her propeller and after over two hundred miles of cruising, unlike some singers that I know of, she never "kicked." In the good ship "Dellie" my son Brun and our guest Mr. Charles Ackly of Pittsfield, Mass., sailed from Cape Traverse the 10th of Aug. and made our first call at Victoria visiting our hundred and then watching a beautiful sun set standing by the grave of daughter and sister with the assurance that the one who had gone from us like one of old "Being Dead yet Speaking."

A very pleasant sail eastward and we rounded St. Peter's Island and in a little while was soon tied to the wharf where we met the manufacturer of our engine with whom we had a very pleasant visit. Our respects were also paid in Charlottetown to Mr. Robinson, Collector of Customs, regretting that we could not enjoy for want of time his congenial company longer.

Leaving Charlottetown at 4.30 p. m., Wednesday our course lay for "Cape Bear" here lights and buoys along the coast some what confused the navigator for in the sea going days of your scribe there were no gass buoys off Indian Rocks and Cape Bear had a red light. A pleasant passage and threatening weather bid us look for a shelter and so at 2.30 a. m. Thursday we made fast to the dock at Murray Harbor Beach. The "main brace" was spliced? with a drink of fresh water and all hands turned in until daylight and then another start for Bridgetown, arriving at the head of the "Grand River" at 2.30 p. m. Thursday. Every inch of this section is hallowed ground to me. It was here when over 70 years ago my father with his parents landed from England. Here where they went into the virgin forest and gave the best days of their lives to the making of future homes. There where they are all buried save those who lost their lives nearly forty years ago when the schooner Emeline went down off East Point and one uncle the only living survivor of that generation of the Clay family now nearly ninety years of age. Dear old man, how good it was to look into his face as it brought to memory the faces of those long since passed away. While here our friend, Ackly, through press of business was called home and after spending ten days at Bridgetown we left for Charlottetown. At Annapolis we called for oil and meeting merchant McFarlane had a few hours of very pleasant fellowship. Head winds forced the crew now of only two on the Dellie to seek shelter and Murray Harbor again became our refuge. How often it happens we reach one another through the "Inner Man" for in seeking good at the heart of the matter. Capt. Chapman and his charming wife and daughter the Jordons and many others all impressing us with their kindness. A continuation of head winds forced us to remain here through the week and we gasolined up to Murray Harbor proper. Here we met Mr. I. Prowse proprietor of the hotel, his wife and daughter who thoughtfulness we'll never forget. Excursions to Murray River in the Dellie, clam bakes, deep sea fishing, duck shooting, have all been engaged in making Murray Harbor a very attractive place. Already we are planning great things of spend for next summer with a party of fifteen or twenty to camp on the Island possibly at Murray River. How I would like to mention all the dear friends who have made our vacation so pleasant but time and space would not allow but father and son will go home proud that we are still British and that British hospitality has no limit.

The last Sunday in August will always be one long to be remembered. The two services one at 8.00 p. m. and the other at 6.30, what a pleasure to preach the gospel to such congregations, toilers of the sea, men with sun burnt faces and roughened hands but hearts as tender as a child. The singing! Ah it had the old time ring for all the people sang. Far, far too short has been our vacation but the call of the "Hock" comes to us and we leave the Island today on the S. S. Halifax for Boston, then four hours on the train and we are at home. It was very hard yesterday for us to leave the "Dellie" at Murray Harbor where she will winter but at the other end

of the vacation is another Dellie who has eyes and ears and hands and feet and a face as sweet as honey and a longing for husband and son that will soon be realized. And now Mr. Editor a word in closing. Pardon this hurried scrambled part written under the trees in Murray Harbor part on the "Dellie" and the closing word on the crookedest road we ever traveled on, the P.E.I. Railway which is really more crooked than a New York State Gou— Prince Edward Island, brightest star in the British Crown, homes of prosperity, people of love, we bid you good bye. Praying that He who will not let the sparrow fall without His knowledge will so watch over you that we may all be spared to meet one another in the summer of 1914.
