Hubbell Hurls Giants To 5-4 Victory Over Phillies For 16th Straight Victory

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—St. Louis Browns ended Detroit's nine-game winning streak and spoiled the Champion Tigers' final home appearance of the season today by battering four pitchers for a 10-1 victory. Ivy Paul Andrews held the Detroit batsmen to six hits.

The Yankees won their 100th victory of the season, blasting a pair of Philadelphia Athletics pitchers for 13 hits and a 12-5 victory at Philadelphia.

Johnny Broaca went the route for the American Champions, turning in his 12th victory of the year, but was hit hard.

At Washington a lucky bounce on Ossie Bluege's grounder with the bases loaded in the ninth inning brought Washington a 3-2 triumph over Boston here today and sent the Senators into third place in the American League. Victory was Washington's second straight over the Red Sox.

Cleveland Indians divided a doubleheader with Chicago today, burying the White Sox under a 17-2 score in the opener and dropping the nightcap, called at the end of the sixth inning on account of darkness, 8-3.

Bob Feller, 17-year-old pitching sensation, limited the White Sox to seven hits and struck out 10 in the opener.

Brooklyn Dodgers staked Van Mungo to five runs in the first two innings at Boston and collected 18 hits to enable the big right hander to coast to his 17th victory of the season by an 8-6 margin over the Bees.

Mungo fanned five batters to run his season's strikeout total to 236.

Pittsburgh's Pirates came back after losing a six-run lead today to score a run in the 10th inning and defeat Chicago Cubs 7-6.

The Cubs, their last chance of remaining in the National League title race blasted by New York Giants' victory over Philadelphia, dropped a full-game back to the second place Cardinals and were

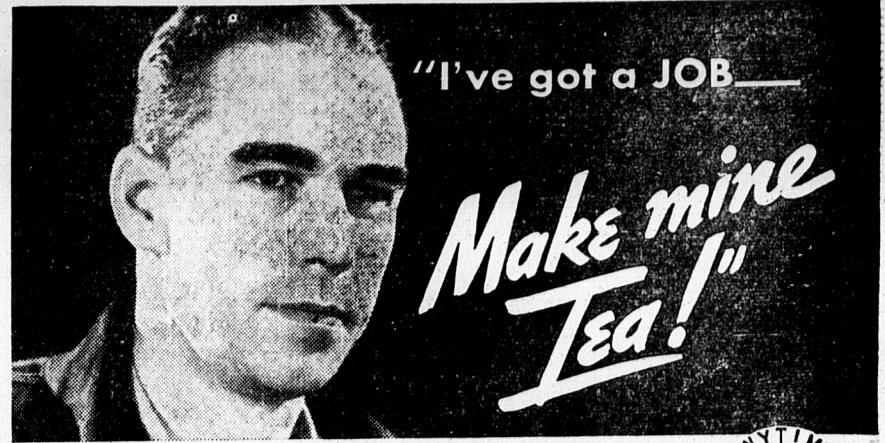
Back in circulation with smashing victories over ex-king Jack Sharkey and blonde Al Ettore of Philadelphia, the Brown Bomber was rapidly approaching his former magnetism as one of the greatest one-man drawing cards in the business of legalized mayhem.

Promoters, who felt like jumping out of their smoke-filled offices three months ago when Max Schmeling crashed the Bomber into a stunning defeat, were smiling and talking big money again.

"Am I laughing?" shouted Promoter Mike Jacobs, holder of the Brown Bomber's fighting contract. "I don't think they can stop him now that he has learned the hard lesson of overconfidence. If I can get Madison Square Garden to shift the Braddock-Schmeling championship go from June to May, then we can start planning right now for Joe to meet the winner in June. It should be a perfect setup for a \$1,000,000 gate."

Receipts from last night's fighting in Philadelphia's huge Municipal Stadium, where a crowd of around 50,000 watched Louis apply the knockout drops to Ettore with two perfectly executed left hooks in the fifth round, brought smiles to "Uncle Mike." Despite the fact that the 22-year-old Ettore never has been a serious heavyweight contender, the gate grossed \$215,279.80, and netted \$176,326.29. Louis' share was \$60,147.89, including his cut from broadcast and motion picture rights as against \$36,765.28 for Ettore.

Louis' next start will be in the New York Hippodrome early in October against Jorge Brescia, former Argentine Amateur champion.

Irish Soccer Team Triumphs Over England

BELFAST, Sept. 23—(CP)—The Irish Football League defeated an English League eleven 2-2 here today. All five goals were scored in the first half.

The Irish representatives defeated the Englishmen 2-1 in the 1936 contest at Blackpool.

Since 1894 when inter-league matches were inaugurated the countries have met on 38 occasions, England winning 32 times and Ireland twice. The remaining games were drawn.

Honors of today's battle, fought before a crowd of 19,000, went to Kelly, Derry City winger. He scored all the Irish goals, one from a penalty kick. Steel, Stoke city centre-forward and Westwood of Bolton Wanderers were England's marksmen.

For the first time in two years no Arsenal players were included in the English League eleven.
