## BOUND FOR CAPE TOWN

British Steamer Loaded With Hay Sailed Yesterday.

BOSTON, Dec. 16.—After a long and vexatious delay the British steamer Montauk, Capt. Martyn, is ready to proceed with her cargo of hay to Cape Town, C. G. H. She has 2,400 tons of hay on board. She will sail at 8 o'clock this morning, and will probably stop at the Canaries or Cape de Verdes for coal.

The detention of the vessel, caused by the rebaling of the hay, and by so many cartloads failing to pass inspection, has been unprofitable to the British government. By the terms of her charter the vessel was allowed five days to load and five days to discharge, and after the lapse of that time she was to receive \$250 per day for demurrage, which will amount to \$3750. Beside the demurrage she will receive, it is said, about \$70,000.

The British schooner Annie Black was towed here last evening from Gloucester by the tug A. W. Chesterton to discharge her cargo of lumber. The schooner is from Parrsboro, N. S. and while putting into Gloucester harbor last Monday morning she went ashore on Dog bar break water and was afterward pulled off in a badly damaged condition, but her cargo keeps her afloat. She is bound for East Cambridge.
