—HAD FINE YEAR.—The annual meeting of the Grand River Dairymen's Company was held in Maple Leaf hall on Tuesday, January 14th with a representative number of patrons and stock-holders present. The president, Mr. James A. McIntyre reviewed the activities of the past year which owing to the low price of cheese has been a difficult one for those companies devoted exclusively to its manufacture. He expressed the belief that the coming season would see much improvement in the cheese market as the prevailing high butter prices of the past year would inevitably cause an increase in butter production and lessen that of cheese. Mr. Joseph D. McLellan, the secretary presented the financial statement which showed gross receipts of \$9,386.05 from which the patrons received \$6,350.12. Sixty-nine patrons supplied 634,516 lbs. milk from which 54,376 lbs. cheese were manufactured. It will thus be seen that it required 11.66 lbs. of milk to produce one pound of cheese. The average price received for cheese was \$1.07 per pound and the average price per hundred pounds of milk was one dollar. The patrons expressed themselves as well satisfied with the year's work and showed their confidence in the industry by subscribing liberally to a new issue of stock. Mr. Linus McNeill was appointed auditor and the following board of directors were re-elected: Messrs. James McIntyre, president; Robert Yeo, vice-president; Stanley Thompson, Joseph R. McIntyre, W. J. Dennis, P. A. McLellan, John D. Leckey, Joseph D. McLellan, secretary.—N.
