CATTLE MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—Cattle receipts on the two Montreal livestock markets today totalled 1,093. There was a fair demand for good killing cattle and prices were firm to a shade higher. Common cattle were very low selling from \$2 to \$3 for bologna and as low as \$1 for canners. Cows of a little better than cutter quality sold down to \$3. Good cows sold up to \$6.75. A few car loads of medium quality and fair weights sold around \$6.75 and \$7, with the bulk of the light steers and medium quality heifers around \$6. Light thin steers sold down to \$5 or under. Four cars of Western Ontario cattle were reported rolling to be shipped from Montreal on export to England.

GRAIN TRADE MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 18.—A feature of the cash grain trade here today was the easier feeling that developed for wheat and oats and values were reduced two cents per bushel. The demand was fair. Owing to the steady rise in wholesale carlot levels last week, butter prices to retailers were advanced one cent per pound today. Receipts were seven-teen boxes.

MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—Today's session was featured by a heavy drive against the amusement stocks notably Fox, which one share was down more than six points from Saturday's close. Selling was accompanied by rumors of a dividend reduction which were later officially denied by President Clark. Radio was the outstanding stock during the morning and in fact heavy volume continued until the close, the heavy turnover and resistance which the stock showed led to the report that a new group had entered the market on the buying side in spite of the earnings report for the first half year. Steel, Can. and Gen. Elec. rallied briskly in the afternoon and the action of these stocks more than offset the selling in the amusement stocks. Closing tone was firm. Sales 1,410,800.
