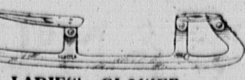

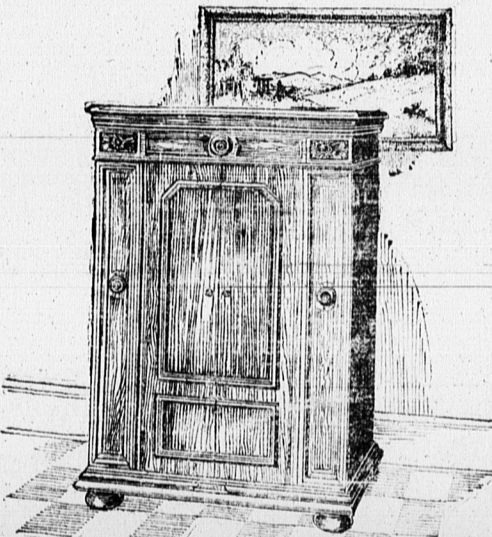
### TIT FOR TAT
