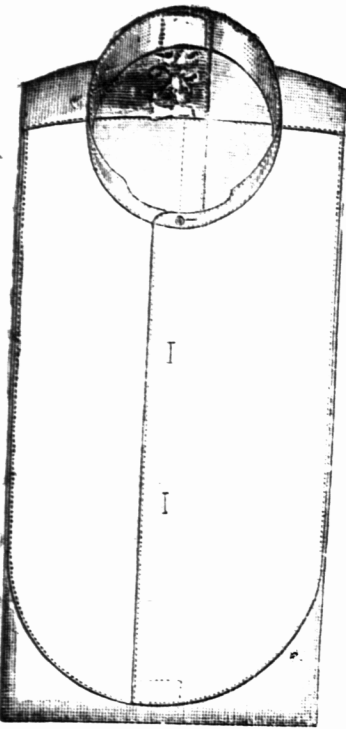

DROWNING
ACCIDENT

Boat Upsets While Overhauling Nets.

PATRICK RILEY SAVED

By Clinging to Boat—English Sank and Never Came to The Surface.

SUMMERSIDE May 20.—(Special)—A sad drowning accident occurred this morning about 10 o'clock, at Bird Island, (one of the group of Islands in Richmond Bay). A young man named English, son of the late Mr. Donald English, of Lot 12, and Patrick Rilly, while overhauling herring nets a short distance from the shore, accidentally capsized their dory, and both were thrown into the water. Rilly clung to the boat and drifted ashore, but English never came to the surface. His body has not yet been recovered. The deceased was 19 years of age, and was the only support of his widowed mother, who has the heartfelt sympathy of the community in her sudden and sad bereavement.
