Interesting items on the program of the C. G. I. T. girls regular Tuesday night meetings were the reading of their weekly paper, "The Alpine Times" and a birthday presentation by the girls to their leader, Miss Beulah Hatch.

Owing to the fact that the pastor, Rev. Ross C. Eaton, is this week conducting special evangelistic services at Marshfield, the midweek service at the Baptist Church was led by Mr. George L. Simmons.

The senior and intermediate departments of the Methodist Church C. G. I. T. girls met together last Tuesday afternoon and heard an interesting talk on candy making given by Mrs. Ernest Coffin, who after stating the general principles of this art, went on to give many recipes that will be found useful during the coming festive season. The girls then, as their activity work for the week, made some confectionery to be sold at the Church's annual bazaar which was held last night.

The ladies of the Methodist Church held their annual bazaar in Methodist Hall last evening. The tea-tables and various booths were well patronized and the affair turned out a splendid success in every respect.

On Tuesday night of this week the Zion Church, C. G. I. T. held a special Mission Study meeting at which Mrs. Forbes of Scotsburn, N. S. gave an interesting and instructive address on missionary work. This talk was followed by the regular activity period during which the girls were engaged in knitting garments to be donated to Home Missions.

The annual Thank Offering of the Women's Missionary Society of Zion Church was held on Wednesday evening. Mrs. Forbes, Maritime President of the Presbyterian W. M. S. was the speaker and told her audience of the place Prince Edward Island holds in Missionary work. The first W. M. S. in Canada was organized in P. E. I. one hundred years ago next June. The first definite steps toward missionary work in any British Colony was an overture from the Presbytery of P. E. I. to the Synod of Nova Scotia eighty-one years ago. The first Missionary sent from a British Colony was a minister of a P. E. I. congregation, and the first Canadian Church martyrs were the Gordons of Alberton. She showed the need for greater effort in the great cause of missions and the responsibilities resting on each individual to do his or her part in spreading the Gospel among those who have it not. Remarks were made by the chairman, Rev. G. C. Taylor, by Mr. B. W. LePage, who moved a vote of thanks to Mrs. Forbes, and Mr. J. T. McKenzie, who seconded it. A solo was beautifully rendered by Miss Lillian McKenzie. A good collection was received.

The Collegian Club under the auspices of the Catholic Women's League, held a very successful student social in Rosary Hall last Saturday night, when an interesting program of music and games was carried out. There was an especially large attendance.

The Central Christian Ladies Aid held a special meeting on Wednesday to prepare for the annual sale next week.

The special evangelistic services being conducted by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Genge, were continued this week.

Last Tuesday night was Missionary night with the C. G. I. T. of St. James' Church, Mrs. R. H. Rogers gave the girls an interesting talk on the subject of Home Missions.

Young Lad Dies Suddenly

The little chap had taken some peanuts from his father's shop on Wednesday evening, and shortly afterwards complained of a pain in his nose. He was treated by his parents and soon, seeming to be alright again, little was thought of the incident. He slept well but at 7 o'clock yesterday complained about his side. Remedies were applied and he then ate a hearty breakfast and prepared to go to school. Just before he was going out, however, he again became unwell and lay down on a couch, as he seemed unable to breathe freely, medical aid was at once summoned, but this proved of no avail and he passed away. A post mortem examination to determine the cause of death was conducted by Drs. Dewar and McGuigan. It was found that the cause was suffocation resulting from the lodging of a peanut in the wind pipe. Besides his father and mother, a loving child and brother.
