Appeal Tribunals

DOMINION OF CANADA
PROVINCE OF
PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

In the matter of the establishment of Appeal Tribunals for the Province of Prince Edward Island under "The Military Service Act 1917." In pursuance of the power conferred upon me as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Province of Prince Edward Island being the Court of last resort in said Province, I do hereby establish the following Appeal Tribunals for said Province, that is to say:

FIRST: An Appeal Tribunal in and for the County of Queens County in said Province to hear appeals from and cases stated by the Local Tribunals established in Queen's County aforesaid.

SECOND: An Appeal Tribunal in and for the County of Kings County in said Province to hear appeals from and cases stated by the Local Tribunals established in Kings County aforesaid.

THIRD: An Appeal Tribunal in and for the County of Prince County in said Province to hear appeals from and cases stated by the Local Tribunals established in Prince County aforesaid.

And I do hereby assign to each of said Appeal Tribunals the following Judges of the Supreme Court of said Province, namely:

For Queens County—Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.
For Kings County—Mr. Justice Haszard.
For Prince County—The Chief Justice.

Witness my hand and the seal of said Court this twenty-fifth day of October One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventeen.

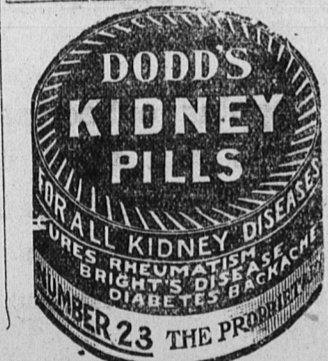

On motion of Mr. Gaudet notice of motion for new trial in the case of Caruthers vs. MacDonald was dismissed with costs. In the matter of the application of W. E. Howatt for a will of certiorari Mr. Warr applied for an order to quash the conviction which was granted with costs. Re Victor Antoine vs. Michael G. Maslin. The absent debtor judgment received with costs on application of W. E. Bentley K. C., application of non suit or new trial in the case of Milford vs. Read occupied the court the remaining part of Tuesday and yesterday and is still before the court. D. PROVINCIAL AND DOMINION CO-OPERATION.—Hon. Murdoch McKinnon left for Ottawa yesterday to attend an important conference in connection with an endeavor to bring about closer co-operation between the provinces and the dominion in the matter of food production.

A HAPPY ANNIVERSARY.—Premier and Mrs. Arsenault yesterday celebrated the tenth anniversary of their marriage and were felicitated by many of their friends on the happy occasion. Incidentally the redemption of the St. Peter's District from Liberalism to full communion with his government made a fitting rounding up of the day's happiness for the Premier. The Guardian joins in best wishes for many happy returns of the day both at the Premier's home and at St. Peter's.

CORONERS INQUEST.—Owing to the peculiar circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. W. H. F. GILL, recorded elsewhere, Coroner W. J. P. McMillan empaneled a jury composed of Messrs. Edward Bell, foreman, J. T. McKenzie, Isaac Carter, Frank Currie, Michael Berrigan and B. S. McKinley. The jury viewed the body and adjourned to meet at 8 o'clock. On resuming a number of witnesses and the police officers who were on duty on that night were examined as to the finding of the injured man on the sidewalk, his being taken home and the calling of a doctor. The jury returned the following verdict: "The deceased came to his death by falling on the sidewalk, striking his head, causing hemorrhage and smothering while his face was in a pool of blood."

A GRAND PLAY.—For about an hour and a half last night at each show Edna Mayo, the famous beauty of two continents, entertained the patrons of the Prince Edward Theatre in her own magnificent way. "Bill" turns out to be a Secret service man and how he saves Joan's family from disgrace and simultaneously the country from war is the climax to the best motion picture play of its class ever put on here. The scenes are real thrilling and a grand air of mystery, keeps the audience on the alert to the final scene. "Don't miss it" is what all those who saw it last night say and if merit is truly appreciated the Prince Edward should be crowded today and tonight.

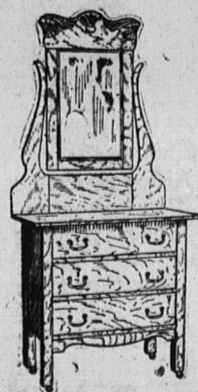

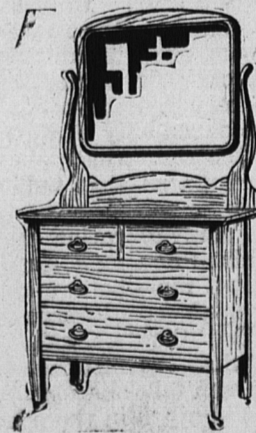

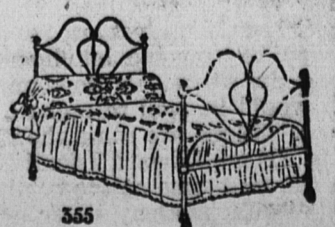
