China Turns Down Jap Ultimatum

Fianna Fail And Labor Allies Still Lead Irish Polls

Only Woman Candidate In Field Elected In Dublin City - Is A Supporter Of Gov't. Of President Cosgrave.

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Feb. 18.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Returns from Tuesday's Free State election to-day showed Mrs. Collins Driscoll, only woman candidate in the field, elected in Dublin City north after the twelfth count. Mrs. Collins is a supporter of the Government of President William T. Cosgrave and a sister of the late Michael Collins, fiery Nationalist leader who was ambushed and shot dead in a campaign against Republican Irregulars in 1922.

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Feb. 18.—(Canadian Press Cable) Tabulation of returns from Tuesday's Irish general election shortly before midnight showed the Fianna Fail and its Labor allies leading by three seats over the Government and its Independent supporters.

GOLD STRIKE

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 18.—What is probably the richest surface showing of gold bearing ore disclosed in Canada in recent years has been uncovered during the past few weeks at Three Duck Lake, which lies in Northern Ontario just west of Makwa station on the main line of the C. N. R. Samples of ore shipped out for assay by the Canadian Government Department of Mines and by other assayers run from \$100 to \$114 a ton, according to the natural resources department of the railway. The richness of the ore is emphasized by the fact that the average gold content of the famous Porcupine area is less than \$10 a ton.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The Council of the League of Nations at the request of the Chinese delegation, called a meeting for tomorrow afternoon to consider the serving of the Japanese Ultimatum.

JAPANESE DEMANDS ARE UNACCEPTABLE; CHINESE WILL FIGHT

Ultimatum Follows Breakdown In Renewed Peace Negotiations Participated in by British, U.S. And France - England Sends Warning To Japs And Chinese.

SHANGHAI, China, Friday, Feb. 18.—(A.P.)—China has the alternative of withdrawing her forces from the Shanghai battle front by sundown Saturday or combatting the concentrated power of the Japanese army and navy.

Lieut.-General Kenkichi Uyeda's ultimatum to that effect specified today that Chinese troops at Chapel, Kiangwan and Woosung must evacuate their front lines by 7 a. m. Saturday (6 p. m. Friday Eastern Standard time) and complete their withdrawal beyond a twelve mile radius of greater Shanghai by 7 p. m. Saturday night, (6 a. m. Saturday, Eastern Standard Time).

The Chinese Government temporarily located at Foonanfu received the demands and indicated it had no intention of acceding to them. Officials described the communication as "intolerable and absolutely unacceptable" and General Thai Ting Kai, commander of the defense forces said, "I am ready to fight if the Government orders me to."

The Japanese Commander-in-Chief's statement stipulated that the Chinese army cease fire and decamp, that the forts at Woosung and Paoshan and the arsenal at Lungwha be dismantled and no defenses erected, that the Chinese retreat be convoyed by Japanese planes.

WARNS BELLIGERENTS
LONDON, FEB. 18.—(AP)—warned China that she or Japan will be held strictly accountable for any further loss in life by British Nationals living in the Shanghai area. It was learned today.

Sir Miles W. Lampson, Minister to China, was instructed to request the Chinese military to avoid such incidents as the killing of two British sailors by shellfire yesterday. No further action in that connection is contemplated but it is assumed the families of the two men will be paid indemnities.

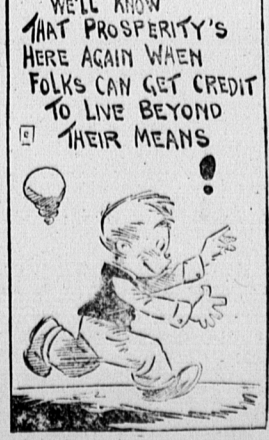
