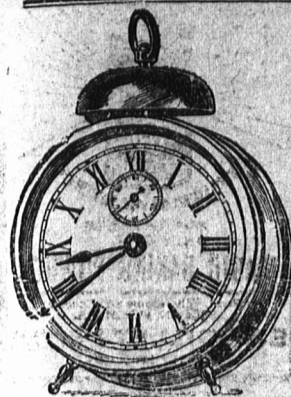

Every attention is paid to correspondence but it is impossible to get anything in writing, especially when as of late many communications are being received each day.

One of Charlottetown's sons, H. A. Gammon, and a reader of The Guardian has sent his favorite paper a postal from the Grand Canyon of Arizona, at which place he says he was on the 10th of last month. The postal contains a portrait of the great granite gorge, one of the wonders of the continent.

The mail boats at the Capes yesterday were compelled to have an enforced holiday because of the blizzard which is described to have been fearful there in the morning. A crossing will probably be made today. The foreign mails for the mainland were sent out from this City last night at 9 o'clock, the train having to leave three hours earlier than the usual time in order to clear the snow from the Cape Traverse Branch. It is most likely that the boatmen will be able to make good passages now that the storm seems to have entirely abated.

The feast of St. Patrick's was celebrated in a most becoming manner at Hope River this year on Monday the 18th inst. In the morning High Mass was sung by the pastor Rev. Father McAuley, after which Rev. Dr. McLellan preached a most impressive sermon on St. Patrick and the many wholesome lessons that are to be learned from the study of his character. In the evening a grand entertainment was given in the parish hall under the auspices of the B. I. S. A most entertaining program consisting of dialogue, music, song and recitation was excellently rendered and favorably received by the large audience. Prof. P. L. Cahill of St. Dunstan's College gave the address, and certainly made a reputation for himself. It was both eloquent and impressive and most enthusiastically received by all present. At the close a vote of thanks moved by Rev. Father McAuley, seconded by Rev. Dr. McLellan and supported by Messrs. Cullen and Connors was tendered Mr. Cahill which he recognized in suitable terms. God Save the King closed one of the best entertainments ever held in Hope River.

The funeral of the late Major James B. Polard took place yesterday afternoon and was attended by many citizens and by representatives of the militia.

The snow and wind storm which raged over Tryon and vicinity on Wednesday morning, was the most severely felt in many years. In the afternoon it calmed down only to commence with redoubled fury, much to the detriment of many buildings in and about the village. The following damages are reported: The dyehouse of the Tryon Woollen Mills badly damaged; a barn owned by P. W. Leard, Tryon, demolished; also a shed owned by John Howatt of the same place; a barn of Mr. McCarvell's at Mette Plains badly smashed up; a building owned by Thomas Trahan, Albany, is also a total wreck. In fact the oldest residents cannot remember of having such a heavy wind and blinding snowstorm in the history of the village. Doubtless there is more damage that has not yet been reported from the outlying districts.

On the railway line yesterday there was a good deal of obstruction west because of the snowdrifts resulting from the storm. The train which left Summerside yesterday morning did not arrive here until after 9 p. m. The train which left here at 3 p. m. for Summerside had some heavy work, and at 9 p. m. had only reached Hunter River. The trains from Souris and Georgetown had better luck, the latter train making the trip to Charlottetown and return and the Souris train also succeeding in doing likewise though considerably delayed. On the Murray Harbor Branch the train which left Murray Harbor for Charlottetown did not succeed in getting in. The Capes special with mails and passengers left the Cape at 9 p. m. and was expected to clear the Cape Traverse Branch without much difficulty. The drifts are reported to have been in places very deep and the outcrops picked with heavy snow hard to get through.

In the Local Legislature yesterday the consideration of the Act to Consolidate and Amend the Public Roads Act was considered in Committee at both the morning and afternoon sessions. The different clauses of the Act came in for a good deal of discussion and some minor changes were made along the lines already indicated in The Guardian when Hon. Mr. Gunnaisky brought the Bill before the Committee on Wednesday. The debate over the various clauses brought most of the members of the house to their feet. Some talk took place about plainly marking the roads in winter when they leave the public highway and enter the field of private owner. The salaries of Road Inspectors was increased to thirty dollars a lot, and some of the members thought this was little enough. The superiority of the plan of getting roads made by day's pay to contract work was generally admitted. After amendments, the bill was finally reported agreed to, and ordered to be read a third time. The King's County change was made along the Act to enable the City of Charlottetown to purchase a Jail Site. The House then went into committee to consider the Act to incorporate the Lords Company, and at 6 o'clock p. m. adjourned till 10 a. m., today.

WILL WAR ON SUNDAY STORES

Auburn Clergyman Says Such Help as Available Will Be Invoked

LEWISTON, Me., March 18—Rev. C. R. Tenney of Auburn, one of the committee of the federation of churches, who are trying to stop the custom of Sunday opening of shops in Lewiston and Auburn, says: "If the proposed reform could be brought about by mutual agreement, every one would be pleased, but it has become apparent that there are some to whom a fair proposition has no appeal. They have no scruples as to the Sabbath or to catching the neighbor's business who has seen scruples."

"For regulation of such the federation will feel justified in invoking such help as may be available. In the two cities there are over 100 shops and stores where business is unlawfully carried on on the Sabbath. Many of these have been forced to do business on Sunday out of self-defense."

"The committee is gratified at the progress which is made. There is a strong feeling in the community against the misuse of our day of rest and worship."

The United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners has endorsed by vote the work of the church federation in the interest of Sunday closing.
