### King Couebman

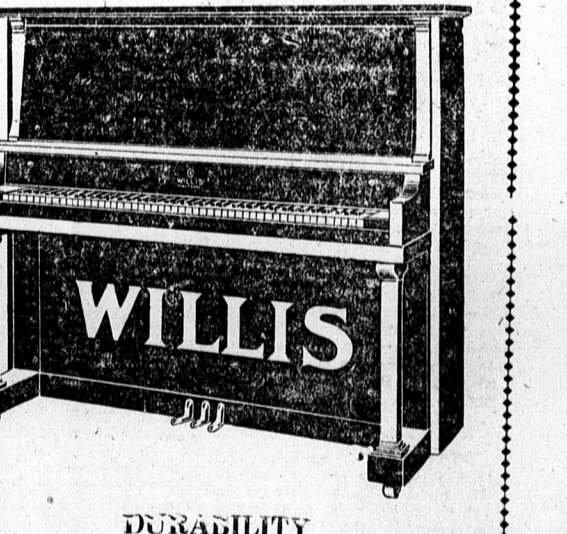
