SCANDAL HINTED AT.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 2.—(Special).—A scandal which may implicate one of Winnipeg's highly respected citizens is hinted at.

During the service at German Reformed Church on Sunday last \$50 was taken from the collection plate together with a valuable diamond ring and gold chain. A prominent person is under suspicion.

DEATH CLAIM PAID.

TORONTO, Feb. 2.—(Special).—The British Empire Mutual Life Insurance Company has paid the death claim of private W. Wynyard, Toronto a soldier who fought in South Africa, and disappeared there.

VICTORIAS HAVE A FIERCE BATTLE

At Westville, N. S. with the New Glasgow Hockey Team—The Game Described as a Fierce and a Dirty One.

WESTVILLE, Feb. 2.—(Special).—In a fiercely fought and dirty game, the New Glasgow hockey team defeated the Charlottetown Victorias by a score of three to two.

With fifteen minutes to play, the game stood Victorias 1, New Glasgow 0. The game then became rough and the heavy checking soon told on the light Victorias forwards. Gregory was slightly injured and compelled to retire. His place was taken by Jack McLean, who was spare man.

Pound then was laid up for repairs and though there was no suitable man to replace him the New Glasgow players refused to drop a man. Gregory again came on the ice in Pound's place. McQuillan was the next placed hors de combat.

New Glasgow again absolutely refused to drop a man. After ten minutes deliberation the Referee forced them to drop a man and the game was concluded with six men on each side.

The game altogether took two hours and a half to play owing to the numerous delays. None of the Victoria players was badly hurt and the team will meet Westville tonight.

The New Glasgow team beat the Halifax Crescents in the last league game by a score of eight to four.

PARLIAMENT WAS OPENED BY KING

With all the Ceremonies in Vogue Since His Accension—The Speech from the Throne ---Prospects for Peace in the Far East Continue to Diminish.

BALFOUR PASSES FAIR NIGHT.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—(Special).—Balfour passed a fair night last night and his condition is satisfactory.

KING OPENS PARLIAMENT.

King Edward today opened the British Parliament with all the ceremonies in vogue since his accession.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

The speech from the throne while regretting the Alaska decision was against the Empire on some points, rejoiced that the question had been settled.

THE EASTERN SITUATION.

A brief reference was made to the far east situation, after mentioning the political mission on which, with the concurrence of China, the Government has entered

Tibetan territory in order to secure a due observance of the conventions. The speech concludes with a warning that although the estimates have been framed with the utmost desire for economy, the burden imposed by the necessities of naval and military defence was undoubtedly serious.

There was no suggestion of legislation concerning Ireland contained in the King's speech.

PROSPECTS OF PEACE DIMINISH.

TOKIO, Feb. 2.—(Special).—There is absolutely no change in the war situation. Russia's movements by sending reinforcements into Manchuria increases the strain of tension and diminishes the prospects of peace.

CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKET

There has been no changes in prices during the past week. Yesterday the snow-drifts and bad roads prevented the usual large number, from coming to the market, consequently supplies were small and demand limited.

Pork (Dressed) holds about the 57 figure. The Dominion Packing Company is paying 5cts per lb for best bacon hogs, and lower prices for coarse lights and heavys. The quantity offering for some time has not been large. Beef by the quarter has been selling at 4 1/2 to 5cts per lb. Mutton and Lamb keep about 5 1/2 to 7cts per lb. Hay (Baled) \$11 to \$11 50 per ton. Hay (Loose) 90 to 65cts per hundred lbs. Oats (Black) are quoted at 30cts and White at 29 to 30cts per bushel.

Turkeys, chickens and fowl remain at about last week's quotations. Eggs from the market baskets are bought at 21 to 25cts per dozen. Butter (Dairy Prints) range from 24 to 25cts per lb, and butter by the tub from 19 to 20cts per pound.
