Sir—I have received the enclosed additional list of prisoners of war and their adopters. In addition to these names two other prisoners have recently been adopted, John J. McBeth, by Mrs. W. Matthews, Mrs. Houston and Mrs. Frank Heartz, and Fred C. Essery by Mrs. A. G. Essery. Our prisoners of war would starve if they did not receive these weekly boxes of food. One prisoner writes that he had just made a good meal of some dry bread thrown away by a French prisoner. The French and Russians are fed better than our men for fear of reprisals. Sergt. Wells, adopted by the Summerside Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire, writes: "The parcels are coming regularly. Received parcel of clothing from Mrs. (Col.) Ings; \$5.00 pocket money from Canon Simpson, tobacco from Dr. Jenkins. I wish to thank them."

Nineteen prisoners are now being provided for and I shall be glad to receive and forward additional contributions for this very worthy object.

5th SIEGE BATTERY AT ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL

Rev. Sydenham Lindsay of Montreal Gives Timely and Helpful Discourse.

On Sunday morning the Protestant members of the Fifth Siege Battery paraded to St. Peter's Cathedral where the service as authorized by the Department of Militia and Defence was carried out. It was a simple pleasing service, so arranged as to be easily followed and participated in by the men of any denomination and was not too long, finishing within an hour, with sermon included.

The hymns sung included such well-known ones as "God our Help in Ages Past," "All People That on Earth do Dwell," "Stand up, Stand up for Jesus," "The Son of God Goes Forth to War," "Holy Father in Thy Mercy," and the National Anthem.

The preacher was Rev. Sydenham Lindsay, curate of St. John the Evangelist Church, Montreal, whose discourse was appropriate and exceedingly well delivered.

He took his text from the ninth chapter of St. Luke's gospel and the 35th verse—"This is My Beloved Son—Hear Him!" The speaker explained that these words were taken from St. Luke's account of the Transfiguration, which event in the life of Christ is remembered on the 6th of August every year by the Church of England. The subject is one full of helpfulness and suggestion. These are words which were addressed by God—and are concerned with Jesus Christ, God Himself called with the command—Hear Him! All the troubles of the world, said the preacher, are due to the fact that Christians have failed to listen to Jesus Christ. Since this war has broken out the statement has been put forth by some that Christianity has failed. Christianity has not failed, but a large number of Christians have failed. They have fallen short in their duty of following the commands of The Master and have failed to let their light shine before men. They have not obeyed the command—"Hear Him." Supposing an officer were pointed out as a General and the men received this instruction—"There is Sir Douglas Haig—obey him." The knowledge that it was Sir Douglas Haig would be quite sufficient for every man to obey Him. The application holds good in the case of Jesus Christ. Not only are we told to listen to His voice and do His will but we are given the power to do it. All are enabled to obey God by trusting in Him. Christ has said: "Keep Thyself Pure." A command is there. The trouble is that we too often do not want to obey. If we would bend our wills we would win and after the first conquest it would be easier each time to achieve victory. Tennyson has said in Sir Galahad:—"My strength is as the strength of one, Because my heart is pure." Hear Jesus Christ he is the son of God. He speaks to us in a thousand ways.
