QUICK FIRING RUSSIAN GUNS

Sent to the Far East in February Last

Will Discharge Thirty-Eight Shots Per Minute—The Latest Proposed French Artillery Tactics.

A matter of great importance in the land campaign in Manchuria is the extent to which the two armies are equipped with quickfiring field artillery. Japan and Russia possess guns of this type, but it is unknown to what extent their troops are provided with them.

The slow-firing field gun, such as those with which the Canadian artillery is armed, can be fired about twice a minute. The recoil sends the gun, carriage and all, plunging back. The gunners must push it back to its firing station, reload, and then aim again.

French artillery officers, who have led in the development of this new gun, have devised a new kind of artillery tactics. The officer in command of a battery will select a certain piece of ground where he supposes the enemy to be. He has his guns fire a certain number of rounds at it with their utmost speed. As they fire the guns will slightly increase their range. When the required number of rounds have been fired the battery will remain silent. Thus, without warning, upon a small plot of land will burst thirty forty, perhaps a hundred shrapnel shells, in one deafening roar.

THE BOOKLOVERS' LIBRARY.

The following letter has been received in reference to a branch of the Booklovers' Library being opened in this city:—

MONTREAL, April 20, 1904

In confirmation of our recent conversation, we wish to advise you briefly of the Club service which we propose to operate in Charlottetown.

We can, of course, give service on this basis to any number of members, but would prefer to have you secure one hundred (100) before starting, if possible. Each member of the club will have one, two or three books (according to terms of subscription), and a surplus stock of one extra book for every four members would be left with Hazard & Moore, who will act as our agents, so that if one hundred members are secured the surplus stock would be 25. We feel that this would give a very satisfactory service, as all of the 125 books would practically be new titles, and although the surplus stock would not be great, the members ought to be able to get satisfaction, as the 25 would constantly be circulating, and no member would see the same book twice. The terms, of course, will be five, eight or ten dollars per annum for 1, 2 or 3 books service. The entire stock of books would be changed once each month, and shipments would be made by express from our St. John Office on the 22nd day of each month. Members could reasonably expect to have their new books two days later, and sufficient copies of popular titles will always be sent, so that each member will have opportunity to read the very books they want each month. This service has already been outlined to Hazard & Moore, and they are now quite willing to accept the agency on this basis.

We trust that you will all feel that you will get good value for the money invested. We are anxious to start the service as soon as possible, and would ask you to lay the matter before those who have signified their intention of joining, at the earliest possible moment.

We are sending today to Hazard & Moore, receipt books, so that they will be able to enroll members at once. As soon as a remittance is received from them for the Club subscriptions, we will give instructions to St. John, and books will be shipped immediately. We enclose, for your guidance, sample Club system order card, and will ask you to read very carefully the simple rules contained thereon. Agents will have nothing whatever to do with orders from the members, as these are to be sent direct to St. John once each month.

If this letter is not entirely clear, we will be glad to supply further information at any time.

BRILLIANT IN MUSICAL CIRCLES

Fred E. Morris Cleverly Performs at Recital.

The Montreal Witness has the following of a well known Charlottetownian:—A large and most surprised and delighted audience listened to the recital in Karn Hall last evening, of the duo of pianists, Robert C. McDonald of this city, and Fred E. Morris of Prince Edward Island, both talented pupils of Mr. O. B. von Kongsberg-Samaron, himself a favored pupil of Rubinstein and Liszt. These two young men are not only talented in the ordinary sense of the word, but they bid fair to become masters in their profession. It is a noteworthy fact that, although they underwent the severe test of playing several numbers still freshly reminiscent of Aus der Oe, they suffered little by comparison.

The program proved an excellent one. Before the concert, many knowing ones had characterized it, as far too ambitious, but it was not one whit so and showed conclusively that both the pianists were quite qualified to play almost anything written for the instrument, and, to more-over, give a good account of themselves.

Those who know the third movement of Bach's Italian Concerto—a stupendous work—know what technical difficulties Mr. McDonald had to overcome in performing it. The player not only over-comes them but gives an interest to his work which Bach sometimes fails to arouse in any but musical students. His technique is excellent, and his interpretation admirable. In all his numbers Mr. McDonald was artistic to a degree and his only drawback at present is lack of confidence, which, undoubtedly will disappear in time.

After his playing of Hummel's 'Rondo' (Concerto, op. 85) Mr. McDonald was enthusiastically recalled, and responded by playing Kaganoff's beautiful 'Berceuse'.

In the duo for two pianos (Weber's Perpetuum Mobile) the performers displayed marvellous unison and a tempo that was always up to tradition. This received a double recall.

Mr. Morris is cool and deliberate in his work, and although his work is not always as clear as that of his confrere there is a dash and vim about it that is very effective. His brilliant execution, especially in the Chopin numbers, drew forth well merited applause. A waltz (compose by the player) proved a veritable gem—full of original theme and treatment, and 'Elfenfantz' (also by the player) had to be repeated.

After the playing of the Liszt Rhapsodie, No. 2, Mr. Morris was again recalled and responded with a delightful rendering of Mendelssohn's 'Spinning Song'.

The excellent work of these two young pianists reflects the greatest credit on their master, Mr. Kongsberg-Samaron who, without flare of trumpets or extra vagant newspaper platitudes, has worked quietly and unobtrusively, in simple love of his art, to give to the world artists who are in truth worthy of being called such. The success achieved, especially in the case of these two young men, must be a source of deep pride and gratification to the teacher and pupils alike.

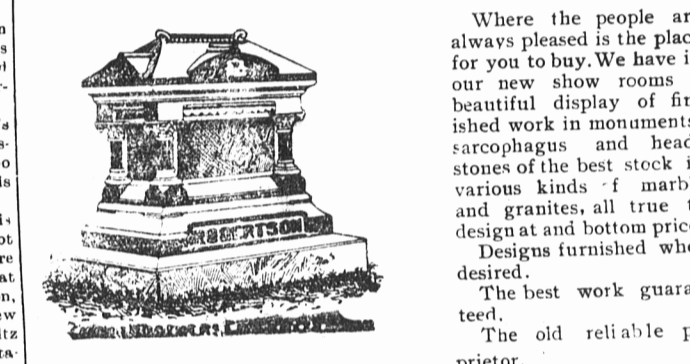
