Americans Win Wide Open Game From Bruins 7-5; Maroons, Rangers Winners

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—A pair of goals by hockey's "iron man" Murray Murdoch, gave the skyrocketing New York Rangers a 2-1 triumph over Chicago Black Hawks tonight, and sent them into a tie with Boston for second place in the National Hockey League's American section. A season record attendance of 17,480 filled the Stadium.

WIDE OPEN GAME
NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—(A.P.)—New York Americans continued in their role as giant killers of the National Hockey League tonight when they whipped Boston Bruins 7-5 in a wide open game, played without a penalty.

It was the second upset triumph of the Americans in as many games and kept them within striking distance of third place in the League's international division.

Tonight's game was slow in the first period but developed into a scoring contest after the Americans built up a two-goal lead early in the second. The Bruins ganged the net time after time only to see the A's match every goal they scored.

Lorne Carr of the Americans and Paul Hayes of the Bruins were high scorers with two goals apiece. Single tallies went to Rabbit McVeigh, Ch. Hextimer, Sweeney, Schriener, Red Dutton and Alx Smith of the winners and Dit Clapper, Babe Selbert and Nels Stewart of Boston. Assists were handed out to a half dozen others of the two teams.

Schriener, the A's outstanding rookie, was forced out of the action in the middle of the final period when he injured his right hand in collision.

CAIN GETS WINNING GOAL
DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 10.—Detroit's hapless Red Wings, cellar occupants of the American division of the National Hockey League, took another beating here tonight, dropping a 2-1 overtime decision to the Montreal Maroons.

Herb Cain's goal in the extra session, a counter which struck the shoulder pads of goalie Roach and then barely dropped over the line, gave the visitors a game in which the goal light flashed on six times although only three goals were allowed.

In the opening period, Eddie Goodfellow's penalty-shot, awarded when Marvin Wentworth tripped Doug Young, best Alex Connell Maroon goalie, but was not allowed because Referee Odie Cleghorn ruled the wing forward had dragged the puck out of the circle before shooting. Then Larry Auris struck the post. Cleghorn again ruling no goal. In the third period Lionel Conacher scored for the visitors but Cleghorn ruled Hootley Smith was standing in the crease and despite a lengthy protest ruled that score out.

Gus Marker tallied the first goal, beating John Rod, Detroit tied it up with a second, to go in the same stanza when Eddie Wiseman beat Connell on passes from Young and Goodfellow.

U.S. Lawn Tennis Assn. Rejects Plan

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 10.—The United States Lawn Tennis Association ratified allegiance to the controversial eight-week rule Saturday night at the same time adopted a means by which the rule may be waived.

LEAFS WIN HARD GAME FROM MAROONS

Canadiens Come From Behind to Defeat St. Louis Eagles 4-2.
(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Feb. 10.—By the margin of one disputed goal and another that young Bob Gracie scored against his own team, Toronto Leafs have separated themselves from the most disastrous slump of their National Hockey League campaign. They defeated Montreal Maroons here Saturday night 4-2.

If Gracie hadn't accidentally batted the puck into the Maroon cage early in the third period during an unorganized effort to clear the ice after Harvey Jackson had shot, and if an eagle-eyed goal umpire had failed to see Charlie Conacher's short shot cross the line by an inch or so in the first period, the Maroons might have come out of a brilliant struggle all even.

After losing three of their last five games and tying the other two, the Canadian section leaders broke loose in the second period against Maroons to really clinch an argument that might have gone into overtime had the breaks gone any other way. For one period, at least, the Smythenmen had a decided edge.

Bill (Flash) Hollett scored a brilliant goal for Leafs and Red Horner added another for a 3-1 lead in the second period, Bob Gracie having tied it at 1-1 in the first. Gracie's disastrous break into overtime had the lovely St. Louis Eagles Saturday night.
