PATHETIC CASE.—Last week when some ladies from Charlottetown were returning home from St. John they met a young woman accompanied by a child on their way to Prince Edward Island from Western Canada. This woman informed them that she was the wife of a son of a certain doctor who lived in Queen's County. She said that she was coming on a visit to her father-in-law to remain for a time while her husband, who had been teaching in the West, but who had resigned from his school had gone to the United States this month, to engage in teaching there. He was to send for her later. Although the place where she was to stay was some miles from Charlottetown, she was under the impression that it was quite close to the city. They advised her to come to Charlottetown and to put up at a hotel and from there telephone to the gentleman whom she said was her father-in-law. She sent the message and the latter came to Charlottetown, but he was greatly surprised at her story, and said that his son was not married. In fact he was at present a student at one of the universities in one of the other Provinces. The poor woman was very much distressed, and the situation was all the worse for her owing to the fact that another child was expected in a short time. She had very little money with her. The trustees of the school where her husband had been engaged had taken up a subscription for her, enough to purchase a ticket to the island and \$15.00 besides. Total Assets Stand at \$692,382,109. of Which Liquid Assets Are \$391,221,832. Equal to 62.55 Per Cent. Liabilities to Public—Substantial Gains in Deposits.

The Annual Report of the Bank of Montreal for the fiscal year to October 31st, is now going forward to shareholders.

The total assets reported are \$692,382,109, as compared with \$655,608,249, at the end of the half year period, and \$637,351,168, one month ago. This increase is evidently due in part to the deposit of Dominion Government funds resulting from the Government Loan which was placed with the public shortly before the end of the Bank's year.

The value of Dominion and Provincial Government securities now stands at \$63,185,030, as compared with \$4,479,182, at the end of the half year. Other accounts include Canadian Municipal securities and British Foreign Colonial and Public securities, of \$37,601,758, compared with \$35,192,972; cheques on other banks \$41,298,174, compared with \$21,656,980.

The general business of the Bank has been well maintained the total loans standing at \$276,968,486 compared with \$275,848,086. The principal account is, of course, the current loans and discounts in Canada these now standing at \$236,656,924 against \$230,135,638.

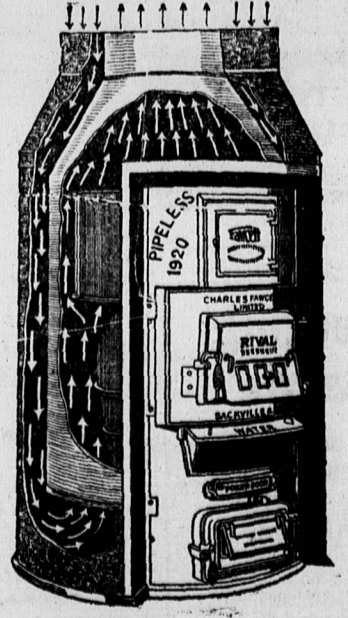
