POST OFFICE—On Good Friday, Easter Monday the Post Office Closures and the Stamp Vendor's ticket will be open from 10.00 a.m. to 12.00 noon. The mails will be received and despatched as usual, excepting the afternoon inland mails which will be closed at 12.00 o'clock. There will be no mid-day delivery from the Street Letter boxes. There will be no delivery by Letter Carriers on Good Friday, but on Saturday preceding Easter there will be both morning and afternoon delivery. On Easter Monday there will be a complete delivery by Letter Carriers in the forenoon, but no delivery in the afternoon.

TRANSFERRED—Captain C. M. Williams, Field Representative of the Land Settlement Branch of the Department of Colonization and Immigration, has received word that Captain J. M. MacEachern, Field Supervisor for the Eastern Section of this Province, has been transferred to Edmonton, Alberta. Captain MacEachern left on the morning of the 16th. Major H. F. Gordon, brother of Mr. J. P. Gordon of this city, is District Superintendent at this place and there is no doubt that Captain MacEachern will meet with the same success in his new field as he achieved in this Province. The entire work of the Department in Prince Edward Island is now under the direction of Captain Williams. This work includes the supervision of settlers established under the Soldiers' Settlement Board, the establishment of families being brought to this Province under the British family settlement scheme, and location of farm laborers. One Scottish family only has arrived to date, and farm laborers are arriving in small numbers.

The great need for expansion in health work is shown by the high percentage of defects found at each new school is visited. 93 schools were inspected during the year. 3334 children were examined, weighed and measured. 95.3% of the children were found to have defects. 81.1% of the children were found to have defects other than teeth. 21.7% of the children were 10% underweight for height and age many of whom showed other signs of malnutrition. 

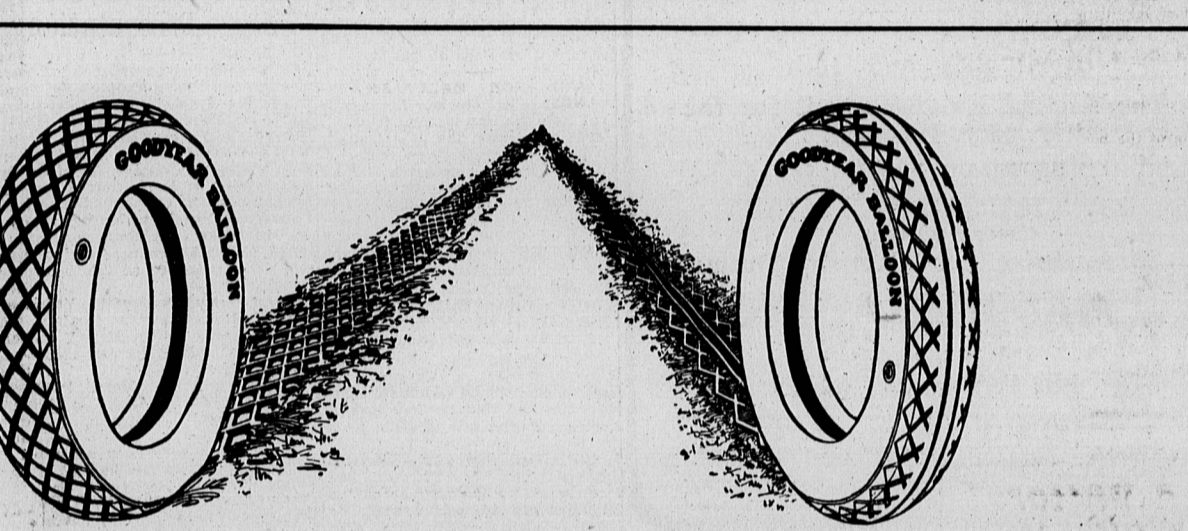
