**Lord Tweedsmuir's University Days**

**EDMONTON, June 2.**—(CP)—Long winter weeks during his university days are recalled by Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General of Canada, greeting as chancellor graduates of Edinburgh University in the University Journal.

Lord Tweedsmuir was elected chancellor last December, succeeding the late Sir James Earle. He will be installed in July.

"My experience in a Scottish University was the strongest influence in my youth," he says, "and with me remain among my most vivid memories."

"In choosing me as your chancellor you have conferred on me the most conspicuous honor, and I might be permitted to take a special pride in being connected with a university which has produced among its sons Sir Walter Scott."

Recalling his student days, Lord Tweedsmuir comments: "I remember the long four-mile walk every morning to the eight o'clock class in the varieties of unspakable winter weather, with which Scotland fortifies her children."

"I remember the rectorial elections when one became a moving mass of peace meal and returned home lacking sundry indispensable garments."

"I remember the rectorial elected six months vacation, when strenuous work gave place to strenuous idleness."
