MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE.

To-day the first session of the ninth Legislature since the union with Canada will be opened with due ceremony by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. This brief glance backward serves to recall the fact that our Legislature is one of the oldest in Canada, having been instituted and held its first session with 18 members in June, 1773—almost 128 years ago. How many Legislatures have been elected and dissolved within that period and how many sessions have been held we cannot now say with precision. The Island population in 1773 was probably not one fiftieth part as great as it is to-day, and it constituted one of the smallest communities on which self-government with elective institutions was ever conferred.

His Honor Lieut. Governor McIntyre is the seventh Governor since Confederation, as Hon. D. Farquharson is the seventh Premier. The Legislature which meets to-day for the first time contains an unusual number of new men, but they are representative of the intelligent manhood of the Island and we conclude the entire body will compare most favorably with any previous Legislature that has convened at the Capital in many years. First sessions are usually short and we see no reason why the present session should constitute an exception. The Government is so strongly supported that there will be little encouragement for party warfare, while at the same time the good business qualities of the leading members of the Administration may be hoped to lead to the prompt despatch of the public business. March has been the usual month of meeting, but it is sufficiently late in the season to stimulate the members to get through with the session in order to attend to the spring's work in their various callings.

Referring to the recent successful application of the sun's rays for producing heat and so operating a steam engine without fuel, the Scientific American says: No invention of modern times has given such an impetus to the development of arid lands as the solar motor.

We have grown familiar with submarine telegraph lines and many cities have adopted the plan of placing their electric wires under ground. Now the British Postal Telegraph Department has completed and laid the longest underground telegraph cable extant. It connects London and Birmingham, which are 117 1/2 miles apart. The cable contains 76 separate insulated wires encased in a leaden sheath, and this enclosed in iron pipe. The enormous expense of repairing overhead wires when disarranged or broken by sleet storms and gales has led to the change.

Bad as are the effects of genuine whiskey there is little doubt that the cheap adulterations commonly sold are decidedly worse. A physician sends us for publication a series of receipts according to which various grades of imitations of Scotch and Irish whiskey, cocktails &c can be and are manufactured at a cost of from \$1.40 to \$2.75 per gallon. Perhaps it would be better not to print the receipts lest some persons not already initiated might be tempted to make some of the mixtures of drugs, dye-stuffs and spirit for domestic use or for sale. But we entirely agree with our correspondent that where liquor is permitted to be sold there ought to be skilled and thorough inspection and analysis by an officer of the Government appointed for the purpose. There is sufficient poison in the best forms of intoxicants without adding the poisonous drugs which are commonly used in adulteration.

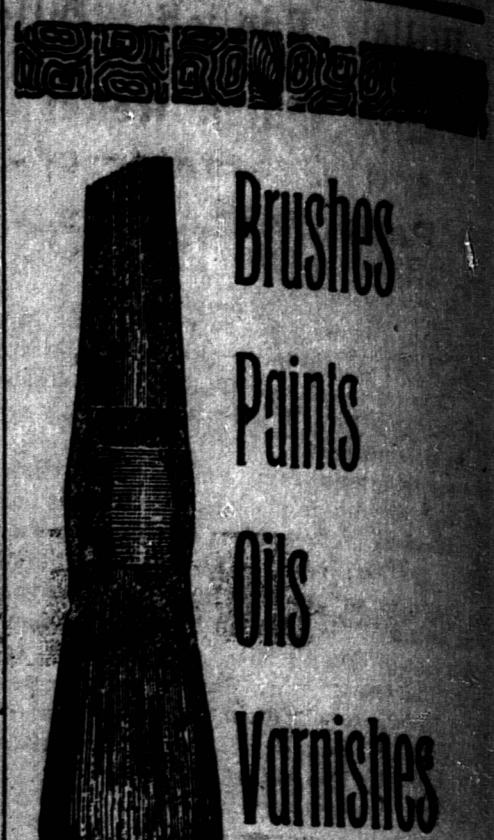
