FOOTBALL MATCH

The Game Resulted In a Draw.

A LARGE EXCURSION

And Excellent Play by Both Teams with an Advantage For Ch'town.

About 200 people accompanied the Abegweit Football team to New Glasgow yesterday on the steamer Stanley.

The result of the football match was not satisfactory to either team for although the Abbies had the best of the argument throughout the match, twice carrying the ball over their opponent's line, and forcing them to range the contest was declared a "draw."

The Abbies were weakened by the absence of Mr. D. A. McKinnon, their speedy forward, and his usual good work was greatly missed.

The grounds were in poor condition owing to the prevailing rains; a strong wind was blowing up the field and fast work was rendered impossible. This was a handicap to the Abegweits whose light but agile forwards and backs are accustomed to solid ground; they were unable to get away with the ball and being much lighter than their opponents were at a serious disadvantage. The referee believed in much scrimmage work and little open play and here the Abbies lost the ground being too soft for effective

Capt. Jackson of New Glasgow won the toss and placed his warriors with the wind behind them. Capt. McLeod kicked off for the Abbies. The ball was returned to centre when Bethune carried it into touch, Ritchie and Cavanagh carried the rubber far into New Glasgow territory. L. McMillan, T. Trainer blocked the line and Bethune carried it to New Glasgow's 25 yard line. Scrimmages followed and the ball was forced in to New Glasgow 40 yard line. A series of scrimmages followed in which the Abegweits did some excellent work. The New Glasgow men worked the ball back, and the half ended with no score on either side.

The second half was a repetition of the first, the Abbies having the ball at their opponent's 10 yard line the greater part of the time. McLeod, Ritchie and J. McMillan tried a run across the field but were unable to reach the line.

The Abbies did some excellent tackling. During the half C. McQuillan and Bethune doing particular good work which together with that by Foley and L. McMillan were splendid. The game ended with no score.

The Abegweit team was under the management of their efficient Secretary Mr. Frank Muncey. The Club is to be congratulated on the unprecedented success of the excursion, the conduct of which was indeed without reproach.

The excellent playing of the League of the Cross Band, under the leadership of Mr. W. J. Brown added greatly to the pleasure of the excursionists.

On the trip home it was noticed that the Abbies "Long Tom" had deserted his team and occupied a prominent position in the band.

THE BOER ENVOYS NOW IN THE UNITED STATES



BULLER NEAR LAING'S NEK

Where The Boers' Strong Position Holds Him In Check.

FRENCH ADVANCING AND BOERS RETREATING

To Vaal River—Belief That no Battle Will be Fought Short of Johannesburg or Pretoria—Train Reaches Mafeking—Boer Envoys Leave Washington to Tour in the Western States.

GREAT IMPERIAL BAZAAR.

LONDON, May, 24.—(Special.)—The Prince of Wales to-day at Kensington, opened the great national bazaar in aid of the sufferers from war.

It will be the most extravagant affair held here, and is expected to prove an unqualified success.

BOER ENVOYS GOING WEST.

WASHINGTON, May, 24.—(Special.)—The Boer envoys remain till Tuesday and then begin a tour in the west.

GEN. FRENCH IS MARCHING ON.

LONDON, May, 24.—(Special.)—General French has reached Prospect Station, five miles north of Rhenoster River.

The Boers are retreating straight on the Vaal River.

TRAINS FOR MAFEKING.

The first train from the north entered Mafeking on May 22 and the first train from the south is expected next week.

MAY FIGHT AT JOHANNESBURG.

Some believe the Boers will make a strong stand at Johannesburg.

NO FIGHT SHORT OF PRETORIA.

The general opinion is that the Boers will not fight before Pretoria is reached, and the Vaal River will probably be reached by Lord Roberts before the end of the week.

GEN. BULLER'S MOVEMENTS.

Gen. Buller's forces have crossed Ingogo entering the Transvaal, but are still held at bay at Laing's Nek, where the Boers are heavily entrenched.

The flanking operations of Gen Buller will drive them out.

There were sixty thousand spectators, one half being foreign pilgrims. The Pope conducted the exercises.

FIGHTING IN THE PHILIPPINES.
