

THE BRITISH LEAVE FIUME

GENEVA, April 29.—The battalion of British troops which occupied Fiume, left the Italians after the Armistice, left Fiume when the Italian delegates to the Peace Conference went to Paris, according to despatches from Agrum, capital of Croatia and Slovenia. The reason for this action by the British, it is reported was to avoid friction with the Italian troops. The despatch adds the Italians are reinforcing their troops in Central Austria.
