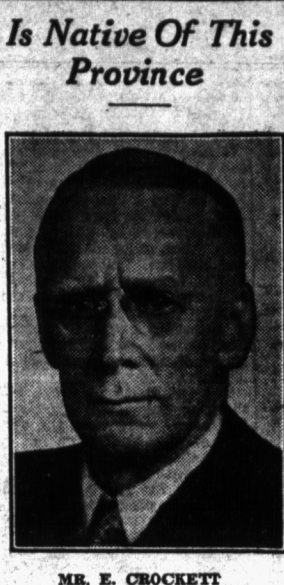

Give Notice Of Need Of Central Bank (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, has taken the first step toward establishment in Canada of a central bank. He gave notice on the order paper today of a resolution "that it is expedient to introduce a measure to incorporate a central bank in Canada, and to provide for the appointment and removal of officers and staff of the bank and the appointment and fees of the directors, and to make such further provisions in respect to the functions, powers and administration of the bank as may be recommended by the Royal Commission on Banking and Currency in Canada."
