**Leo Durocher Signs To Manage Dodgers**

**BROOKLYN, Nov. 25 (AP)**—Leo Durocher, who insists he wants to stay in Brooklyn until the day he dies, today signed a one-year contract to manage the Dodgers in 1947 at a salary representing a substantial increase over his bonus arrangement in 1946.

Although details of his financial pact with president Branch Rickey were not divulged, it had been reported that Durocher was paid a basic \$42,000 plus approximately \$20,000 in attendance bonuses last season.

"I have no doubt that Leo is the highest-priced manager in baseball," Rickey admitted. "A bonus arrangement was not discussed nor was a long-term contract. You may find it hard to believe, but we didn't even talk salary. I would like to make it clear that we were not competing with any offers from other clubs."

Rickey announced that the Dodgers would train in Havana next spring and would take a 10-day excursion to Panama for a series of exhibitions.

The most surprising news was the announcement by Durocher that Jake Piltzer, a "field man" in the Brooks farm club organization last year, would replace Chuck Dressen as coach.

Piltzer, of Binghamton, N. Y., who has managed minor league clubs for several years, will handle the first base coaching job and Leo will return to third base next season. Johnny Corridor will be retained and a third coach may be named later.

**Winnipeggers Not Too Eager To Bet In Favor Of Team**

**WINNIPEG, Nov. 25 (CP)**—Morally speaking, Winnipeg football fans are 100 per cent behind their Blue Bombers in the quest for the Canadian rugby championship against Toronto Argonauts at Toronto Saturday—but they're none too eager to flash greenbacks in favor of the western titheholders.

Toronto bookies are reported here to be laying 2-1 that Argos will win the classic, while bookies here are a little more "sporting"—allegedly giving 4-1 for Argos, and 2-1 that Bombers drop the contest by 20 points or more.

At Bombers' final workout at the Y.M.C.A. here last night, coach Jack West said he believed he has worked out an effective defence against Argos' passing game. He admitted quickly however, that there was a lot of difference between designing a pass defence and having it effectively carried out by the men on the field.

Many fans are worried about the long Bomber lay-off from actual competition since Nov. 2—the western Canada final—and point out that Argos will go into the fray with the keenness of recent competition. But West said the boys are keen and sharp as if they had just finished their schedule.

**Plan Tourney For Vacant Boxing Titles**

**MONTREAL, Nov. 25 (CP)**—Tournaments to bring together candidates for vacant Canadian professional boxing titles are being planned by the Canadian Boxing Federation, President Frank Hogan of Montreal announced today.

Mr. Hogan indicated the proposed tourney would go beyond the planning stage yet.

Earlier this month, champions were named in four divisions but the heavyweight, light-heavyweight and featherweight classes were left vacant.

No contenders were named in the heavyweight class. Vernon Ego, who has been around as long as any of the current crop of fighters, was named king of the middleweight class. Len is a fair country fighter but it is doubtful if even his most ardent admirers would rate him among the world besters.

Montreal's slugger Johnny Greco, who built a name for himself in New York, came home during the summer to lift the welterweight title from aging Dave Castilloux. Greco probably is the Dominion's best-known boxer but even he has his ins and outs.

Little Danny Webb, another Montrealer, lit the headlines in the United Kingdom where he served with the Canadian Army and scored victories over some big name British boxers including record weight champion Jackie Paterson. The Negro boy's overseas record earned him a shot at Castilloux's lightweight crown and he lifted the title by decision.

Fernando Gagnon of Quebec, the bantamweight champ, won his title by knocking out the pre-war holder Eddie Peirin. Vancouver's Kenny Lindsay is better-known internationally than Gagnon and his backers think he should have been named champion, but the Federation had to go by the books and chose the man who beat Peirin. They named Lindsay number one contender.

The Montreal Boxing Commission had a hand in the Greco and Webb fight, where they recognized these boxers' bout with Castilloux as championship events although the Boxing Federation contends titles are at stake only in 12-rounders as these were.

Mr. Hogan said today the Federation had fallen in line with the Commission in recognizing the new champions although it was against our wishes," he added, however, that in future all title fights must be 12-rounders or they won't receive Federation sanction.

**Teams Selected For Orange Bowl Meet**

**MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 25 (CP)**—The Orange Bowl today became the first of the major bowls to announce its teams for the New Year's Day football classic with the signing of Forne Institute of Houston, Tex., to meet Tennessee Volunteers.

The contest will bring together two of the outstanding teams of the Southwest and Southeastern conferences and should feature a wide open brand of football in which both schools are well known.

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**Danny Webb Belts Out Decision Over Arthur King**

**TORONTO, Nov. 25 (CP)**—Montreal's Danny Webb, Canadian lightweight champion, tonight belted out a decision over Toronto's Arthur King in the headline bout of a boxing card that attracted a crowd of 5,000 to Maple Leaf Gardens.

Webb weighed 127 1/2 and King 128 for their non-title affair which went eight rounds.

The Toronto fighter moved out in his usual fast pace at the opening bell while Webb circled and followed, cautiously feeling out the relatively new comer to the professional ranks.

It went to the third round before Webb, who had to almost jump to hit, finally found the true mark. In the third, the Canadian lightweight champion really let loose. As the round closed, Webb had King worried with his snappy straight rights and left hooks.

Lt. Arthur came back in the fourth to lay his potent left jab on his shorter opponent and made a better showing.

Neither boy hit the deck due to a wet spot on the canvas brought King down on two occasions. Webb fell once on a trip but bounced right back in again.

From the sixth on, Danny Webb was scrapping with a leg and arm punishing infighting in the eighth by Webb as it was all King could do to hold out with the more experienced mitt slinger.

**Ban Men's Rugby Rules For Girls**

**LONDON, Ont. Nov. 25 (CP)**—The Lipstick Ladies and the Powder Puff Pansies will have to stick to their knitting—they aren't going to play rugby under men's rules.

The co-eds of the University of Western Ontario had been booming the "Powder Puff Bowl" game for some time until some parents started asking questions. The university authorities got interested and Dr. G. E. Hall, dean of the medical school and president-elect of the university, let it be known that he did not like the idea at all. Chief opposition was expressed on the grounds the girls were going to play under men's rules, with possibilities of injuries.

The girls had previously made one concession—it would be tough rugby with no tackling. Members of the senior champion Western Mustangs had been acting as coaches and Johnny Metras, who coached Western to Western intercollegiate title, had been slated for water-boy.
