The Kirk Pulpit

Preaching last evening on the text "Take Away Her Battlements, for They are Not The Lord's," (Jeremiah 5:10), the Minister, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers said: To begin with, I would think of the Bible, that little volume to which our debt is infinite that revelation of the love of God, crowned in the precious gift of a Redeemer. It is the book whose words we learn in infancy. It is the book we turn to when we die. It is the book which comforts us in suffering, cheers us in battle, hushes us in grief, is the only book that never fails us amid all the change and chequer of the year, for it is higher than our highest thought, and it is deeper than our deepest need. In it we find the language of our prayers; in it the passionate cry of our confession; in it the joys which link us with the angels; in it we read the story of that sacrifice which is too good to have been false, without which we cannot live and dare not die. It is then, the Bible, the inspired book? Go, ask you sufferer upon her sick-bed. Ask you woman who has proved his promises, and cling to them in sunshine and in storm. Ask you sinner who has found a Saviour there, in the hour when his feet were on the brink of hell, and vain was the help of man. It is such things, and it is such things only, that are the valid proof of God in Scripture. It is not merely, nor verbal accuracy, nor literary rendering of the original text. And wherever men have buttressed up the Bible by proofs which were never intended by its Giver, there has come the voice that once was heard in Judah, "Take Away her battlements, for they are not the Lord's." That is what true religion has always done—all loving, patient, critical inquiry. It has not touched the living word of God. It has rather removed the defences God never built. And so it has drawn us down—down to a level which is forever throbbing in the word, in whose mercy is our only hope, and in whose will is our peace.

Claim Island Vacancies Zero

OTTAWA, Oct. 11—(CP)—Housing shortage? Not in Canada, mate.

Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation has taken a postal survey of 88 municipalities across Canada, and reports that in them there are 1,374 vacant family dwellings.

Take Vancouver, for instance where veterans' families have seized several buildings recently to find a place to live; there are 157 vacancies.

Housing-short Toronto has 112 vacant houses just going begging, and matched by Arvida, Que. home of wartime miners with 122. Ottawa, which has been waylaid by seven sorties by veterans seeking accommodation, has 19 vacancies.

Only tiny Prince Edward Island can really be said to have housing shortage. Its vacancies are listed as zero. But Nova Scotia has 38, New Brunswick 10, Quebec 256, Ontario 512, Manitoba 68, Saskatchewan 91, Alberta 108, and British Columbia 289.

Even Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation is a bit puzzled by the figures.

TORONTO, Oct. 11—(CP)—An all-time high of 16,887 stage registrations at the University of Toronto for the year 1945-46 was disclosed today by the University fourth report on registration. It total thus far exceeds last season's figure by 4,000.

JIFFY MEAT LOAF

2 lbs. ground beef	2 tablespoons Heinz Prepared Yellow Mustard
1 1/2 cups dry bread crumbs	2 1/2 teaspoons salt
