Conan Doyle Arrives With Final Proofs

Conan Doyle is back in the United States with what he calls the final proof concerning spiritism. He showed to a half hysterical audience in New York photographs taken at the Cenotaph in London, in which appear the faces of the spirits of some of the dead soldiers, which were drawn to the spot by the thoughts of their friends and loved ones. So far as the provision of the necessary hydro-electric power will soon become scenes of great activity and the forward movement will be well on its way, constituting the most notable programme on record to wrest from Mother Earth the riches which are known to await the application of pick and drill.

Mr. Hope Exposed.

For example, an English medium named William Hope is said to be the greatest of all mediums in the matter of getting fairy photographs and Hope is credited with a large share of the credit for having over Conan Doyle. Some time ago he undertook to produce fairy photographs under what are called "test conditions." That is to say, he would produce the pictures on plates which could not be doubly exposed. The manufacturer of these special plates sent them in a sealed package to the seance, each plate being marked with the maker's trade mark by means of an X-ray. Two of them came back with the fairy photos, but unfortunately for Hope neither of the plates bore the trade mark. This led some to brand Hope as a fraud. But the British College for Psychical Science defends Hope and suggests that the sealed packet was tampered with, probably by the manufacturer or by someone else interested in having Hope discredited. At present British spiritists are quarrelling over the Hope pictures.

Wonderful Willy.

Similarly some of the producers of ectoplasm have been exposed. The most eminent of them, however, Willy Sch, a young Bavarian, has not been detected in trickery, and it is said that he has convinced the leading German and Austrian scientists who have examined him as to the genuineness of his phenomena.

The False Explained.

Of course, false mediums have been unmasked almost as long as there has been a belief in spiritism, but it is true that if ninety mediums out of a hundred are swindlers it does not necessarily follow that the other ten are of the same brotherhood. What is significant is that nearly all the great mediums have at one time or another been exposed. The one that is cited to-day as proof that there are honest mediums and marvels that can be revealed may be exposed tomorrow. The spiritists meet this situation with the admission that even mediums who are genuine sometimes finding the occult power wanting, and desiring to give a demonstration, have resorted to faking. They say, in effect, that even the maker of counterfeit money more often than not handles genuine banknotes. They point to the fact that not infrequently a minister of the Gospel proves to be a scoundrel, but that his dereliction does not prove the falsity of religion. Woman And 9 Men Slowly Starving

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., April 23.—Nine men and a woman are slowly starving to death on Fox Island in Lake Michigan, 18 miles off Northport, Leelanau County, and are unable to reach the mainland on account of huge ice floes in the lake.

Word of their plight was received here tonight from Gilman A. Dame, former state food and dairy inspector, who appeared to the Grand Rapids Herald by telephone to obtain an airplane from Selfridge Field, Mount Clemens, for their rescue.

Three other men who were on the island reached the mainland today. They left in a small boat which was crushed to pieces by the ice, and made the remainder of the distance by jumping from one floe to another, according to Mr. Dame.

Mr. Dame said the men and women went on the island before the opening of winter to cut wood. They bought their food and other provisions to last them, but their supplies ran out a few days ago. It was then that three of the men undertook the perilous trip across the broken ice to Northport.
