ed before Saturday when the vote for leadership will be taken. It was noteworthy today that as soon as the Island delegation got settled in their hotels, they were approached by supporters of Agriculture Minister Gardiner who asked them to "Vote Gardiner on election day. Arguments of the canvassers were first that a fighting politician like the Minister of Agriculture would stand up better against prospective Opposition leaders like Ontario Premier Drew or John Diefenbaker than would Mr. St. Laurent. Their second argument was that if any leader other than Mr. Gardiner is chosen, floor prices under such commodities as potatoes and apples will sag and perhaps be done away with altogether.

Whether delegates from Prince Edward Island are being influenced to the extent of changing their views is not known.

On Speakers' Panel The two Prince Edward Island members placed on the panel of convention speakers are Premier Jones and J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew. It is possible that they may not be called upon to speak but have been asked to be in readiness if called.

Delegates reported their train journey to Ottawa to have been a pleasant one. They were regaled with anecdotes about the Liberal Convention of 1919 at which Prime Minister King was chosen as party leader, by Senators McIntyre and Sinclair. Premier Jones was in high good humor, telling numerous stories and recalling incidents of Provincial and Federal political history.

Hon. Harry Cox and Russell Clark, M.L.A., engaged in endless games of Forty-Fives on the train, first one then the other holding the upper hand. Senior member of the Prince Edward Island delegation is James McCargle of Kinkora, Prince County.

Senator Brewer Robinson of Summerside was a leading member of the Island delegation. He attended this afternoon entertained in his offices in the Senate. James Lester Douglas, M.P. for Queen's was one of the first of the delegates to Ottawa to have been registered.

Leading the group from Queen's out to the Coliseum at Lansdowne Park, three miles south of the Parliament Buildings, and seeing that they had all the necessary information and convention instructions.

Mr. Douglas held a lituus "Queen's Caucus" in his office on the fourth floor of the Parliament Buildings, sending his party all registered and in good standing.

On the way from Prince Edward Island to Ottawa, the Island group was fortunate in meeting a special medical officer of its own in the person of Dr. T. V. Grant, M. P. for King's. Happily all were in the best of health and required no attention but agreed it was an excellent thing to have an experienced physician as one of their party.

Entertainment Apart from the business of the convention an ample program of entertainment for both men and women delegates has been organized by the National Liberal Federation. There are two or three receptions this evening, a monster garden party at the Central Experimental Farm on Thursday evening, and innumerable drives, luncheons and dinners.

Each Provincial delegation has its own caucus room at the Ottawa-Lewia Coliseum, that from P. E. I. being at the south-east section of the building. A preliminary caucus will be held tomorrow morning to choose a chairman and spokesman.

R.C.A.F. Takes Lead In S'ide Baseball League The R.C.A.F. baseball team went into first place in the Summerside Baseball League for the first time this year when they defeated the Red Sox yesterday in a hard-fought game by the score of 5-4.

The Airman drew first blood when in the first frame Brawley hit safely, stole second, advanced to third on Bayne's sacrifice and came home on Mickus' base hit.

In the third the Flyers made it 2-0 when Bayne doubled and crossed the plate on another two-base blow by Anderson.

The Sox squared it up in the fourth, filling the sacks by reason of hits by Powell and Walper, and Williams' life on Foy's error. Carson smeared Clow's grounder, scoring Powell, and Landry walked, forcing Walper across the plate.

In the next inning the Red Sox got two more. Gaudet belting a double and coming home when Powell's smash between first and second got Walper's grounder. After Walper had chalked up his third hit of the game, Powell scored as Foy was slowing up Williams' smash to the box, Bourque retrieving the ball and throwing Clow out at first.
