SECRETARY for work among young men at Sydney—W. LeRoy MacDiarmid of Warren, Pa., has accepted a call to the Secretaryship of the Sydney Association and will arrive there Feb. 28th. A reception will be tendered early next week. Mr. MacDiarmid has had a splendid training for the great work now thrust into his hands, and in this enterprising town will find scope for his powers as a leader in work for young men.

THE question of having Contractor Barry at Pictou replace the blades on the propeller of the Minto is still undecided. The work will probably require four divers and will necessarily have to be commenced as soon as the steamer may drift too far from the seat of the operations if there be delay in the matter. Each of the blades which is fitted into position in the hub and then bolted on, weighs about half a ton. The material for the work is all on board the Minto with the exception of the divers apparatus.

R. C. GOFF in writing from San Francisco to a friend in the city speaks in glowing terms of his trip to the west and the delights of California weather. Mr. Goff finds a successfully enforced prohibitory law in force in the city of Drayton since 1890. There are three provisions of their law that bear heavily on the sellers. One makes the liquor dealer where the drunkard got the liquor pay \$5 a day to the state for the drunkard's keep while he is in jail, all consignments of liquor by railways, etc., are confiscated and the houses where liquors are sold held responsible for the fines imposed and an injunction put upon the house for a year more or less which closes it up. Under this law says Mr. Goff not a drop of liquor can be obtained as a beverage in Drayton.

THE adjourned meeting of the Retail Merchants' Association was held in the City Court last night. There was a good attendance. President Hughes occupied the chair and after reading of minutes submitted his report. Two general meetings were held, five executive meetings. The report was an able presentation of the benefits of the association. The question of the second main for the city was taken up and discussed at length. The benefits which would be resultant in lowered insurance rates were emphasized and the opinion expressed that the City Council and the Water Commissioners should take the matter in hand at once. The question of the higher insurance rates was also considered at length. After considerable discussion the election of officers was proceeded with. It resulted as follows:

PHYSICIANS say that pneumonia is a highly contagious disease, the cause of which is a micro-organism in the sputa of those suffering from the malady, and contracted by inhaling this germ. Therefore the same care should be taken as in pulmonary tuberculosis, or in the fact that the disease is most prevalent in the winter season, when people are most crowded together and live much of the time in badly ventilated apartments, making obvious the necessity of thorough ventilation of houses, offices, factories, theaters, churches, passenger cars and other public places, in order that the air which must be breathed may be kept clean and free from infectious matter. Laymen should be taught not to be afraid of a patient who has pneumonia influenza or tuberculosis, but to be afraid of lack of cleanliness about him during his illness, of failure to enforce prophylactic measures and of close badly ventilated apartments during the season when these diseases most prevail. Since pneumonia is most fatal at the extremes of life—the young and the aged—special care should be taken to guard children and old persons against exposure to the infection of those already suffering with the disease and against cold, privation and exposure to the weather, which are potent predisposing causes.
