Contract Bridge

One Effect of a Redouble. Few players realize that a redouble may have a far-reaching effect on the play of the hand. Observe this case:

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

♠	A K 7	10 8 4
♥	A 8 6 4 2	Q J 10
♦	K 5 3 2	9 5
♣	Q J 10 6	A 9 7 4

The bidding:

North	East	South	West
1♠	1♥	1♠	Pass
2♥	Pass	4♠	Double
Redbl.	Pass	Pass	Pass

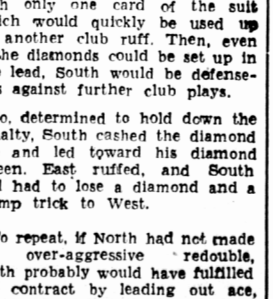
North's second-round two-no-trump bid was such a stretch, in itself, that he certainly might have restrained himself after West doubled four spades! (Incidentally, West also exhibited great optimism in this action.)

West's opening lead, however, did much to redeem his indiscretion in the bidding — he ignored his partner's heart overcall to lead the club queen. South ruffed the second round of the suit and he could scarcely fail to take a serious view of the situation. Apparently West had at least four trumps for his double, and the diamonds required two leads. Not being vulnerable, South might have played the hand "Wide open" against a mere double, but the fact that North had redoubled acted as a brake on South's nerve.

So, determined to hold down the penalty, South cashed the diamond ace and led toward his diamond king and another trump. West would probably draw still another round of trumps, leaving South with only one card of the suit which would quickly be used up on another club ruff. Then, even if the diamonds could be set up in one lead, South would be defenseless against further club plays.

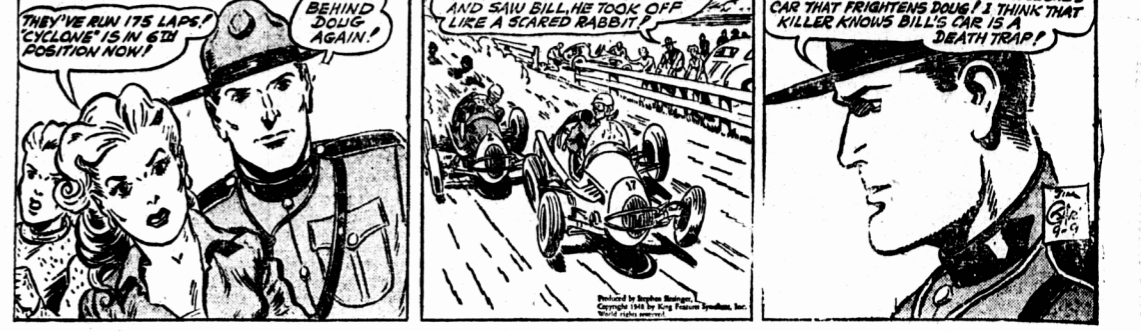
To repeat, if North had not made his over-aggressive redouble, South probably would have fulfilled the contract by leading out ace, king and another trump.

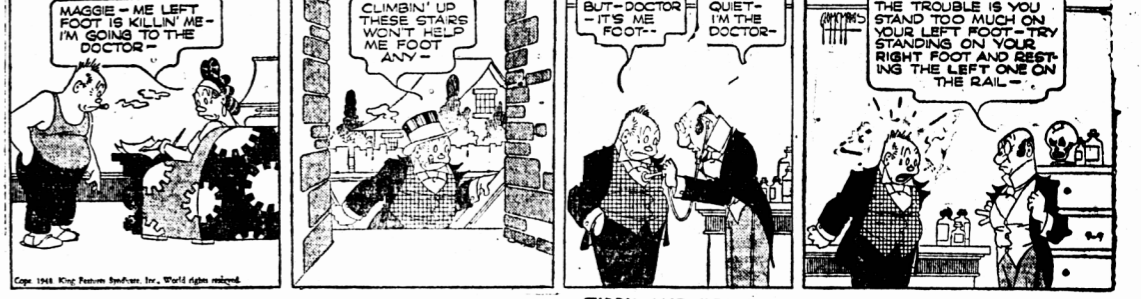

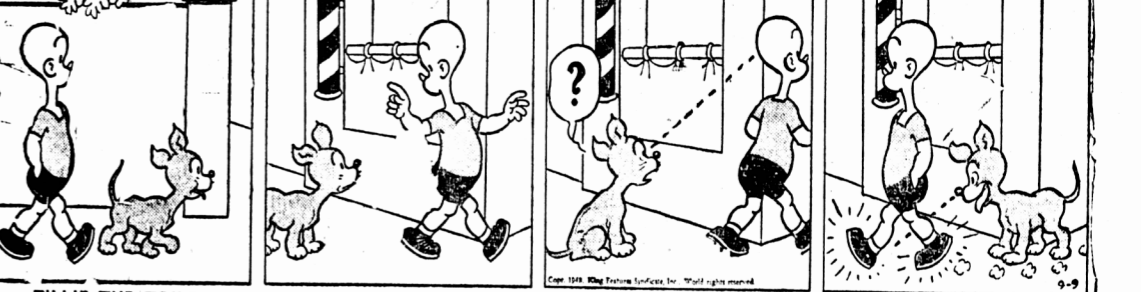
