QUARTERLY REPORT OF GRAND DIVISION

From the reports of my deputies it is a matter of congratulation that there is no falling away in our membership but on the contrary, a substantial gain during the quarter. Our finances too, are in a most healthy condition, being over the four hundred dollar mark. These are matters of which we are justly proud, as greater than these stands the magnificent fact that we are the only Province in Canada under a Prohibitory Law.
Casting our eyes abroad we are pleased to see that the New Brunswick Federation of Temperance is moving along temperance lines and at the first meeting of their Legislature in February next, they will ask for a Prohibitory Law for the whole Province. E. Tennyson Smith, the world renowned temperance orator and lecturer, has been lecturing in the adjoining provinces with great success. He has aroused Moncton from its long lethargy to the necessity of taking an active hand in the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act and has established a Civil Reform Association whose special object will be to elect temperance men to their city council's board. Fredericton also is being stirred to its centre by Mr. Smith, and a great good will result. Yarmouth, in Nova Scotia, has had an awakening to the necessity of putting forth more activity in temperance work, and are moving for better enforcement of the C. T. A. Quebec too, is shaking her locks and is demanding a reduction of the hours in which strong drink is sold to her people in the saloons. They are demanding also that her hotel laws shall be abridged. The West is calling for assistance to rid themselves from the thrall of the saloon. Our respected P. C. W. P., Rev. A. D. McDonald, writes from Alberta thus: Last Sunday night at Lamont I brought up the subject of temperance and at the close of the service got all the voters present, but one, to sign a petition for amendments to our License Law. One amendment is to limit the number of licenses, in town, to two for the first thousand and one for every additional thousand of the population. Another requires the bar-rooms to close

With this object in view I have been in correspondence with E. Tennyson Smith the latter day John E. Gough, in the endeavor to secure his services here for a series of six or seven lectures. We require an awakening to our duties and responsibilities and we think no other man within reach can do the work better.
Since we met the messenger of death has invaded the ranks of this Grand Division and called hence an honored and valued member. In the death of our brother Hon. George W. Simpson, P. C. W. P. and a P. D. M. W. P., our order has suffered a serious loss, one we cannot replace. In company with Brother S. F. Hodgson, D. M. W. P. I attended his funeral and represented the order as one of his pall bearers. As I listened to the testimonies of the two officiating clergymen and witnessed the deep sense of loss on the part of relatives and friends I felt that our order is enobled by the touch of such good and true lives.
