SPINNING INVENTION SPEEDS WOOL MAKING BRADFORD, England, July 11—(CP)—A new wool spinning device which authorities say may prove the most revolutionary invention since the mechanical spinning jenny is going through its final tests.

BRADFORD, England, July 11—(CP)—A new wool spinning device which authorities say may prove the most revolutionary invention since the mechanical spinning jenny is going through its final tests. Its inventor is Air Vice-Marshal Geoffrey H. Ambler, one-time commander of the Royal Observer Corps and now associated with a Bradford spinning firm. His new device is expected to simplify wool spinning and save time and labor. No details have been set out. But the invention is said to eliminate three or four operations now necessary in worsted spinning and to speed up production. The development will be adaptable to present plants. It is expected to cheapen production costs and release for other work a certain amount of labor now required in spinning operations. Air Vice-Marshal Ambler is 45, a former Cambridge rowing "blue" and one of the best-known pilots in Yorkshire. He was own-pilot of the Yorkshire Airplane Club in 1926, became honorary air commodore of the West Riding auxiliary air force squadron at Yeading in 1947. He was awarded the O.B.E. in 1941.
