"Joe E. Brown" At The Capitol

The new Joe E. Brown comedy, "Joe E. Brown," which opens today at the Capitol Theatre, presenting the wide-mouthed comedian in one of his funniest pictures. Joe is cast as a clumsy newspaper man. The princess is returning to America to marry Joe.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH. The Rev. Lewis M. Murray conducted both morning and evening services at Trinity United Church yesterday. Rev. Mr. Murray took as the theme of his morning sermon "Christ can supply our need." He recalled the story of the two blind beggars who met Jesus in Jericho and said to Him "Lord, have mercy on us." Jesus answered, "What wilt thou that I do unto thee?" and they replied, "That we might receive our sight." And Jesus had compassion on them and healed them. They were children of God, said the Minister, and worthy in God's sight. Jesus saw them, not as they were only but what they might become. In this personal, burning love for two blind useless men we see why Jesus went to the cross. Put the cross into that look of compassion and ourselves into the place of the blind beggars and we have the truth about our relationship with Christ, said the Minister. Pointing out that people were perplexed with life's problems, broken in spirit and body; people afraid of calamity, of the future; people, the victims of lust and greed and oppression, Rev. Mr. Murray claimed the trouble was that people had not tried Christ's way yet. He urged the way to discover Christ's power was to listen to Him, to get close to His mind and message. Claiming that blindness was at the root of almost every need and that every person had a need, whether he realized it or not, the Minister appealed for greater faith that with God's help people will triumph as Christ triumphed through His belief and faith led Him to the cross. Rev. Mr. Murray took as the theme of his evening sermon "The Mighty Power of God." Miss Marguerite Guldmore sang very acceptably Handel's "Angels ever Bright and Fair" at the morning service.

Mr. T. C. Edgett Passes Away

T. C. Edgett, 59, native of Moncton, N. B., but for the last 20 years or more a resident of this city, died at his home North River Road last night. He had been ill and confined to bed since last February, though lately his condition seemed improved. Shortly before his death, he stated he felt much better and although he would get up, and his death came as a great shock to his family and friends. He first came to this province in the employ of the Imperial Tobacco Company, but shortly after his retirement from this concern, purchased a farm on North River Road, on the outskirts of Charlottetown. He went in extensively for fox-breeding, and up to the time of his illness had followed this vocation. He is survived by two sons, Jack, and Tom at home; daughter, Hazel; a brother Fred, of Moncton, and another brother Vancouver; and a sister in Moncton, whose name could not be learned last night. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed, pending arrival from Moncton of his brother, Fred.

MONTREAL, Aug. 21 (CP)—The stock market shifted into second gear Saturday as it continued its return to higher levels. Except for a brisk buying spree at the opening, trading was extremely quiet. Gains of a half point were scattered liberally through the list in the equipments, Massey-Harris (rised 3-8 and Canadian Car 1-8 while National Steel Car was unchanged after opening a half point. Among the metal issues, Noranda added a half point, Hollinger 3-8 and Nickel 1-8. Howard Smith moved up a half point in the papers, and St. Lawrence Corporation 1-8. Elsewhere, Dominion Bridge took a sudden leap, shooting up 2 1-4 points to close at 36. Gypsum improved 3-8 and Montreal Power 1-4. Total sales: 18,900 shares; Industrials 7,500; Mines 11,400; bonds \$550.
