The Yankees were out hit 12-10 but put on three fast double plays to help Danny MacFadyen go the route and took advantage of four Chicago errors for an early lead. Red Faber who opposed MacFadyen for two innings, was charged with four of the misplays.

MacFadyen blanked the Sox for six innings but in the last three frames they got to him for seven hits and all of their runs, one of them a homer by Red Kress in the ninth with the bases empty.

Telephone Course For British Boys

LONDON, Sept. 20—(CP)—Teaching boys the rudiments of a telephone is a new branch of work for the British Post Office, and to this end 1,000 skeleton telephones have been sent to schools in all parts of the United Kingdom. The telephones are to be used for instructional purposes as part of an effort to make the youth of Britain telephone-minded.

A Post Office official said: "These telephone outfits have been produced at the request of big business houses, who complain that school boys, who have just left office, are 'frightened' by the telephone. We shall, therefore, loan them to schools so that the boys can not only obtain telephonic instruction, but also see exactly how the telephone works. The Board of Education has co-operated in this scheme."

National League Winners Receive Great Welcome

Crowd Of 20,000 On Hand To Greet Giants On Their Return From Western Trip.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20—(A.P.)—The big town blew wide open tonight as Bill Terry led his Giants home with the first National League Championship New York has known since the end of John McGraw's title reign in 1924.

A turbulent crowd estimated to number at least 20,000 swept like a flood through Grand Central Station. They smashed police lines, swamped two bands, tore each others clothes half off, and finally stuffed the ruffled warriors into automobiles that bucked them clear of the mob.

For fully an hour before the Giants' train from St. Louis, where they were when the Pennant was clinched yesterday, pulled into the station at 3 p. m. E.S.T., the crowds gathered about the announcer's stand, waiting for news. The school band from George Washington High School, 30 strong, paraded in red sweaters and white ducks and here and "Success" a lesser known composition of the schoolboys, Not to be outdone, the station porters quickly summoned their band, only 20 in number, but louder than the schoolboys, farther down the platform. Between them they almost blew the roof off the station in a half-hour wait for the train. More thousands, not knowing what was happening but attracted by the noise came rushing in to find out. Most of them joined the celebration.

Four new bass drums and a couple more pairs of cymbals were recruited just as the train arrived. The porters launched the players out onto the platform. Out came Terry, a long clear in his mouth.

Charles A. Stoneham, owner of the Giants, shook Terry's hand. William A. Dalton, President of the New York Athletic Club and head of the Mayor's committee of welcome, shouted a message of congratulations in the manager's ear just as the bands, in a desperate side by side battle for supremacy between "Hall, Hall, the gang's all here" and "Success" a lesser known composition of the schoolboys, reached their absolute peak.

STOCKS DROP IN NEW YORK EXCHANGE

Wheat was off 1 1/2 to 2 cents a bushel and cotton, under pressure virtually all day, yielded \$2 to \$2.30 a bale net. Bonds were again supplied freely and buyers were hesitant.
