Strike Problems Still Unsolved

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 15. (By the Canadian Press)—Two delegations conferred with public executives yesterday regarding strike matters and went away to consider secret proposals made to them.
 A group of nine striking textile workers from Lawrence, representing the 22,000 out in that city, conferred with Governor Joseph B. Ely at the State House. Meanwhile, Mayor James M. Curley was closeted with John N. Levens, chairman of the steamship agencies committee, and Richard Parkhurst of the port authority, in an effort to settle the strike of 3,000 longshoremen in Boston.
 Mayor Curley submitted a proposal of longshoremen for the settlement of the strike to Levens. He said he lacked authority to act on it but would offer it for the consideration of the steamship companies representatives. All concerned in the meeting declined to make public what the proposal was.
 He issued an order for \$32,000 to redeem community memorial building bonds.

CAHAN REPLIES TO COMMENT OF LONDON PRESS

Canada's Action Justified in Safeguarding Home Industries.

(Canadian Press)
 OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 14.—No re-primations against the British Government for abandoning the gold standard were contained in his recent statement, declared Hon. C. H. Cahan, acting Minister of National Revenue. Dealing with an editorial in the London Times in which exception had been taken to his reference to this action by the British Government as being arbitrary, Mr. Cahan in a statement tonight said he had used the word in a legal sense and without sinister meaning. (he used "arbitrary" as meaning "in the sole discretion of")

In his former statement, Mr. Cahan had given the reasons that prompted the Canadian Government to pass orders in council considered necessary to safeguard Canadian industry as a result of the depreciation in the value of sterling. While these orders in council applied dumping measures against British goods coming into this country it was contended that one result had been to increase the British preference as against United States since the premium which the U. S. dollar at present holds over the Canadian dollar was taken into consideration in appraising the value of the U. S. goods coming into Canada.

Replying to the Times' editorial which was entitled "A Misleading Statement" Mr. Cahan's statement tonight follows:
 "My statement contained no re-primations against and no adverse criticism of the action of the British government or Parliament in suspending the right to purchase gold bullion from the Bank of England under the act of 1925, nor of the confirmation of that act by the recent Gold Standard Amendment Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom. In incidentally referring to that action as arbitrary, I used the word in its strict legal sense and without any sinister meaning nor did I make the silly suggestion that such action was designed to increase unemployment in Canada.

"The results of that action were wide-spread, and Canada was there by involved in conditions of financial stress and strain such as we have not experienced in recent years, and the Canadian Government was compelled to adopt forthwith remedial measures to safeguard the stability of our financial and industrial institutions, and to maintain the revenues and credit of this Dominion.

"If the Times were disposed to discuss this matter in that spirit of co-operation and mutual understanding which its editorial so strongly commends, it might have reported my statement in the same interview to the effect that the premium now paid in Canadian currency for New York funds, and the appropriate action which has been taken by the Canadian Government in respect thereto, have given British products in the Canadian market a tariff preference over United States products which the British manufacturer has never hitherto enjoyed in this country.

"It is difficult to understand at this distance why action to maintain and to extend the British preference should have produced a disagreeable impression in the minds of those resident in Great Britain who entertain hopes of closer economic relations with Canada."

In his review of Mr. Cahan's earlier statement, the Times editorial referred to the claim that if action had not been taken by the Canadian Government, thousands of Canadian workmen and workwomen would have been thrown out of employment.

Horrors of War Emphasized By Solicitor General

(Canadian Press)
 OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 15.—Painting a vivid picture of the horror and desolation which must inevitably result from another war, Hon. Maurice Dupre, Solicitor General for Canada last night addressed students of the University of Ottawa on the problems of Disarmament.

The forthcoming Disarmament Conference at Geneva, in February 1932, will represent the first attempt yet made to bring about a general limitation or reduction of armaments based on common agreement, Mr. Dupre told his audience. The Solicitor General was one of the Canadian delegates to the last Imperial Conference in London, and was chairman of the arbitration and disarmament committee of the conference.

"The post-war disarmament movement is based on agreement," Mr. Dupre said. "Its roots lie in the horror and futility of the last war, that war in which ten million men were killed and thirteen million missing. Where the daily loss of life amounted to 16,586, where the parade of dead, marching ten abreast from sunrise to sunset, would take forty six days to pass it, a given spot."

Since the war the feeling had grown that not only did armaments fail to prevent war, but that they actually encouraged war. They not only failed to give security, but they prejudiced security. "Give a man a loaded gun, and he will likely want to pull the trigger," said Mr. Dupre. "Give him one that is superior to that possessed by anyone else, and the temptation will be irresistible."

Mr. Dupre outlined the difficulties as well as the factors making for success of the coming conference. Fear was the father of armaments, he said. "Remove fear and you remove guns, bayonets, poison-gases and other abominations, provide security, and you can turn swords into ploughshares, but not before." There were political difficulties to be surmounted, and also technical difficulties. The challenge of new and more dangerous forms of armament must be met. He dealt with some of the possibilities presented by chemical discoveries the effect of which would be to destroy life behind the actual fighting lines as well as in them.

Samuel's Attitude Under Criticism

(Canadian Press)
 LONDON, Oct. 15.—Capt. Alan Graham, Conservative opponent to Sir Herbert Samuel, secretary for Home Affairs in the National Government, today declined to stand down and relinquish his opposition in Darwin.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald today joined with Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council in the National Government, and Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, former Nationalist Chancellor of the Exchequer, in regretting the opposition to Sir Herbert.

"I would beg the constituents of Darwin," the Prime Minister wrote, "to put the national needs first." Sir Herbert sent a copy of Mr. MacDonald's letter to Capt. Graham. Capt. Graham replied that had Sir Herbert showed himself to be unwaveringly anti-social there would have been no opposition to him. Capt. Graham also cited Sir Herbert's "persistent failure to repudiate our chairman's secret letter to Liberal candidates and also your official party leaflets which assert that 'protective tariffs are futile and stupid and that they are doing far more harm than good'."
