

Calgary Wins Grey Cup In 12-7 Victory Over Ottawa Rough Riders

 TORONTO, Nov. 28 — (CP) — Helped by a strange mental lapse by Ottawa Rough Riders, a fighting Calgary Stampeders team just wouldn't be beaten upset the Eastern Canada football champions 12-7 here Saturday and took the Grey Cup west for the first time since 1941.

The underdog Stampeders, averaging 10 pounds lighter along the line and given only an 8-5 chance, showed a roaring crowd of 20,000 jamming Varsity Stadium for the sudden-death Dominion final that tury and drive — and lots of heart — sometimes can move mountains. Never before had a Calgary team represented the west in the Dominion final.

Five times Riders threw away the ball on fumbles or wild laterals, often forced into them by Calgary's charging wing-line and hard-driving tackle. The Riders never stopped trying. They might have won going away were it not for the bonehead play — it could be called nothing else — that gave the alert Canadians the opening for their winning touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Ottawa had taken a 1-0 lead on Tony Golab's first-quarter single, only to see Stampeders go out front 6-1 seconds before halftime on a time-worn sleeper-play forward, taken by Norm Hill from Keith Spith for a touchdown. Early in the third quarter, Bob Paffrath climaxed a battering drive with a major that put Riders out front again, 7-6.

That was the setting for as strange a picture of mass confusion as ever seen on any senior gridiron — a play that will be talked about for years to come along with other classic examples of split-seconds that decide championships.

The Riders were on the march near their own 40. On an extension around left end, Paffrath got away a wild lateral pass that went forward and ahead of Pete Karpuk, the intended receiver. The horn blew to denote an offside pass and Karpuk evidently forgot the important regulation — a horn never ends play, it takes the whistle to do that.

Karpuk made no apparent effort to recover the ball nor did any other Rider. Karpuk headed back to where the majority of players of both teams were frozen about the spot where the officials were making the offside pass.

Woody Strode, Calgary's lanky Negro end, hustled over the ball, picked it up and ambled down the sideline. A United States import player playing his first Canadian season, he said later that he wasn't too sure what the ruling was on the play, but decided "to run first and find out afterwards."

The whole thing was a picture in slow motion. Even Strode seemed to be going at half-speed, keeping one eye turned to the referee to see for a signal that would call him back. A couple of Riders gave chase and Strode was trapped after going about 15 yards.

But Jim Mitchener, up from Vancouver Bombers for his first senior game, had followed up Strode and the lanky end laterals as he was falling to Mitchener, who ran to the Ottawa 10 before he was overhauled.

On the next play, Pete Thodos, who played for the Junior Vancouver Meralomas last season, dodged through the unsettled Riders for a touchdown. When Fred Wilmot made his second convert of the game good, it put Calgary out front 12-7 and ended the scoring.

The winning touchdown sparked a Calgary celebration that reached a climax when the colorful cowboy-garbed supporters tore down the goalposts at both ends the moment the game ended. White 10-gallon sombreroes went sailing into the air, silk-shirted supporters hugged one another in glee and the Calgary cowboy band struck up wild-west tunes.

This was the first time the Rocky Mountain foothills city had ever corralled a Grey Cup — the first time Calgary had ever been represented in the final. The 400 or more home-town supporters who travelled more than 2,500 miles just to see the game made the most of it.

A big factor in the Calgary victory was the brilliant forward passing of Spith, the 25-year-old import quarterback who played with Honolulu Rams last season. He completed 11 of 19 forwards for a total gain of 132 yards against the three of 19 Ottawa completed two by Paffrath and one by Howie Turner.

Boston Bruins Win Two Week-end Games; Wings Leafs, Hawks Take One

BOSTON, Nov. 28 — (AP) — The Boston Bruins put goalie Turk Broda out of the white-washing business tonight by romping over his Toronto Maple Leafs, 8-2 in a National Hockey League game before a packed 13,900 crowd, at the Boston Garden. Broda had shut out Montreal Canadiens and the New York Rangers in his previous starts.

That Toronto goalie had not been scored upon for 135 minutes when Pete Babando launched the Bruins' savage attack by rifling in a 35-foot shot during the third minute of the opening period.

It was obvious throughout that the Maple Leafs' heavy schedule series against the Second Hockey League team from Saint Dunstan's University captured the Island Intermediate trophy crown by defeating the Prince of Wales College Welshmen by a score of 5-0 to bring further glory to the local University in this year's football accomplishments.

With the senior squad capturing the N. B. P. E. I. intercollegiate series against strong opposition from Mount Allison University of New Brunswick and only missing out by the slimmest of margins for the Maritime intercollegiate title against Saint Francis Xavier, the second squad rounded off a very commendable season by retaining the intermediate title.

The intermediate series was one of the closest and most evenly matched contests to be witnessed here for many years, and despite the fact that the Welshmen lost out in the fifth and final game, they were a courageous and smooth working gridiron specialists without a shadow of doubt, and are to be commended for their stand-out performance during this year's football season.

Since last Thursday's City League hockey encounter between Navy and Prince of Wales, this column has received several friendly criticisms from players and fans, concerning the crediting of assists to the wrong players. Realizing that a mistake in crediting an assist to the wrong player could and would spoil some of the player's chances in the individual scoring honor and league ratings, the writer would like to point out that the customary practice insofar as the press is concerned, is to take into consideration credits given by referees.

As far as this column is concerned, it is possible that assists are given where they are not justified and probable too, that some players are not getting credit for ringing in on plays where credit is due. However, without the services of an official scorer, the best possible tally is being kept.

Due to the fact that the referees themselves have a pretty tough job in keeping check on the play, and no one is infallible, a solution to the problem would be the appointing of an official scorer who would have no other duties to perform other than seeing that the proper credit is given to the deserving players.

The curling season got underway Saturday with a number of impromptu matches being played. The ice surface was in very good shape for so early in the season and the curlers tonight would be looking forward to one of their most active seasons in the history of the organization. Inter-club competition will get underway Wednesday, Dec. 8th, when the final bonspiel will be held. Some 32 rinks are expected to compete with 20 from the local club and the remainder from Summerside, Montague and Alberton.
