New Ambassador To China

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29—(AP) One of the more remarkable living Americans has been named United States Ambassador to China. Dr. John Leighton Stuart is a quietly spectacular blend of east and west, of young and old of the worldly and the unworldly. At 70 he has the supple figure of a boy, despite nearly four years of internment by the Japanese. Ever the Japanese respected Dr. Stuart. They gave him such special treatment that his only complaint afterward was loneliness. Where the friction of old and new in China has rubbed other Americans raw Dr. Stuart has flourished. For four decades people have been laying their quarrels in his lap. He hears both sides out, then begins suggesting things tactfully in the soft Virginia accent of his parents or the erratic idiom of a native Hangchow, as required.
