## LEAF WINGER WELL OUT IN FRONT

### Conacher Holds Eight Point Lead Over the Nearest Rival In Scoring Lists.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25—Possibility of Charlie Conacher of Toronto Maple Leafs being overtaken by any other marksman before the National Hockey League season ends appeared remote tonight, official league figures showing him with eight points more than Frankie Boucher, New York Rangers centre, his nearest rival.  
Big Charlie, who patrols the right boards, scored two goals and one assist during the week ended last night to bring his total to 45 points including 23 goals, more goals as well as more points than anyone else. He led the whole league last season.  
Boucher added but one assist in the week for 10 goals, 27 assists, 37 points, just holding his second place in the whole league over Harvey Jackson, Toronto left-winger, who has 20-16-36. Jackson is second in actual goals with Earl Robinson, Montreal Maroons right wing, third with 17.  
Byd Howe, Detroit's recent purchase from the Chicago Black Hawks, high up with 15-20-35, next place being shared by Robinson, Larry Aurie of Detroit and Art Chapman, New York Americans, each with 34.  
The biggest individual gain of the week was by Paul Thompson who was to the fore in Chicago Black Hawks' wins of the week. He picked up a goal and four assists, most of them in Sunday night's 6-1 victory over Maroons.

## Former Maritime Hockey Stars Prominent In N.H.L.

MONTREAL, Feb. 25—Former Maritime Hockey League players now performing in the National Hockey League are well able to hold their own with more experienced players if the statistics issued from league headquarters tonight is a true indication.  
Bill Cowley who once wore a Wolverine uniform has amassed nine scoring points in the brief period he has been with St. Louis, made up of five goals and four assists. Bill Miller, former Moncton Hawk, has three goals but his offensive power has been curtailed by plenty of rearguard duty. Sammy McManus has one assist credited to him but has had a lot of hard luck and then he spent a large part of the season with Windsor.  
Bert Connolly, a regular with Rangers since the season started, is up with the better-than-average players with a total of 19 points—nine goals and 10 assists—more than most first-season players can compile in the complete schedule. Connolly also aided Moncton to two Allan Cup triumphs.  
Pete Kelly, one of St. Louis' most recent recruits who formerly put punch in Charlottetown Abies' attack, has scored twice and aided eight times for a total of 10 points. Bill Hollett, who has played most of his hockey away from his North Sydney birthplace, is a near-by star rating and is leading defencemen in scoring with 10 goals and 11 assists for 21 points.

MONTREAL, N. B., Feb. 25 — A visit to the Upper Canadian centres of Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, also to the cities of Quebec and Three Rivers, from the Maritime Provinces can be made very economically on the bargain fare coach excursion being operated by the Canadian National Railways on Friday next, March 1st.

## Site Of 1940 Olympics Is Undecided

OSLO, Norway, Feb. 25. — While representatives of Italy and Japan engaged in an animated verbal dispute over which nation would be host to the 1940 Olympic Games, word spread through the committee chambers that the international classic may be awarded to Finland as a means of settling the contention between the Italians and the Japanese.  
Several weeks ago Japanese officials announced joyously that Italy had withdrawn its bid to hold the games but today, as the International Committee opened its session, Count Boacossa, the Italian delegate, said Italy was still a candidate.  
The Japanese ambassador, Signora, said Premier Benito Mussolini had promised his country Italy would drop its demand that the 1940 games be held in Rome. Count Boacossa replied that Italy's remarks had been misunderstood.  
In view of the disagreement between the two leading candidates, the committee proposed not to vote on the site of the 1940 games until tomorrow but now there is a likelihood decision will be deferred still further with the prospect it will be left to a written mail ballot.

## HAWKS AND RAMBLERS PLAY DRAW

### 90 Minutes Of Play Fails To End 3-all Draw In Moncton.

MONCTON, Feb. 25—Moncton's Intermediate Hawks and the Amherst Ramblers battled through ninety minutes to a 3-all draw in the first round of the play-downs leading to the Maritime hockey championship, here tonight. It was an even struggle all the way and the score is a very good indication of the play.  
The teams were deadlocked at 2-all at the end of the regulation periods and in the second overtime Amherst claimed a goal which the goal judge declared was not over the line. The result of the dispute was that the goal-judge was removed. It was a gang attack and a pile-up in front of the goal mouth and from the press box it looked as if the rubber was over the line before goalie Art Bourque pushed it out quickly with his hands.  
The rival squads produced flashes of fast and clever hockey and had a fair sized crowd of fans on their toes at times.

While Dickie was still serving his second period penalty, Vic Fraser jammed the puck into the Moncton net 32 seconds after the start of the final session as the Ramblers ganged the Moncton cage, but before the period ended, Kenny Carroll tied the score on a passout from behind the Ramblers' cage by Appleby.  
In the first over-time Robinson fired in a clear goal to put Ramblers ahead, but the Hawks ganged the Amherst cage and Robinson tripped Carroll to prevent a goal and was penalized. While he was absent Carroll scored the tying goal on a three-way passing bout.  
B. Couvillier was hurt in the first overtime when struck in the face with the puck but after first aid treatment, returned to the game wearing a large patch over his face.
