CERTAINTIES OF THE FUTURE The certainties of the future, in the judgment of the present writer, are (1) a revolt of the world's common sense against the present system of international politics, with their intolerable burden of fleets and armies; (2) an immense advance in the social condition of the working classes, due to the new political force these classes will derive from cohesion betwixt themselves; and due, in an even higher degree, to the new authority of Christian ideals amongst all classes; and (3) a new authority which Christian faith will take, largely as the result of science, which, like Kepler, will learn "to thank God's thoughts after Him." But this new authority of religion may express itself in terms which, at first, the Churches may not recognise.

The Minto went to Fort Churchill and Nelson River, and on the way through Fox Strait had a bad hole made in her bow by the ice. The damage had to be repaired from ice pack. The weather in Hudson Bay was more open than usual, but was squally and uncomfortable all the time the steamer was there. The Minto left Halifax on July 12th and was preceded by the schooner Chrissie G. Thomey. The latter is on her way to Halifax. The steamer Eric, of Newfoundland, took a cargo of coal to the Bay for the Minto. On the way home the Minto visited Baffin's Land, where the missionaries were reported starving. They found the report to be incorrect. Sergt-Major Haytor, of the Canadian Mounted Police, who has been at Fort Churchill for the past two years, returned on the Minto. He served with distinction in the South African war and was promoted. On arrival here he was informed that he had been granted two months' leave of absence and consequently will proceed to his old home in England to visit his friends. Captain McPherson and all on board the Minto are in good health. Capt. Anderson, of Ottawa, who went to the Bay in the interests of the government, also returned on the Minto. —Halifax Ex. (Captains McPherson and Anderson are natives of this city.)

ANNEXATION OF BAHAMAS TO CANADA

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—That the annexation of the Bahamas to the Dominion would result in appreciable benefits to both countries was the gist of an interview with Sir William Grey Wilson, H.C.M.G., Governor of the Bahamas, who arrived in the city today and saw Premier Borden, presumably in regard to the annexation problem. "I am not in a position to state the secret progress of the negotiations in this connection," said Sir William, "but I undoubtedly think that great benefits would accrue to both countries in the event of the agreement being ratified. Our House of Assembly authorized the Government to seek annexation, and its resolution to that end had been acknowledged by the Canadian Government."

The big problem before us now in regard to trade is that the United States tariff is prohibitive in regard to our staple lines of "produce, our communications are also inadequate, and practically everything has to pass through American hands. Canada would not only be helping a lame dog over a stile, but would also be reaping the more material advantage which the great development of trade would bring. It would be a great advantage also from an imperial point of view. I will not deny, however, that there is a section of the popular proposal to change the present status quo."
