



Life Insurance Protection

TORONTO, — October 30 — New ordinary life insurance protection put in force by Canadians during the month of September, 1948 totaled \$83,995,000. It was announced here today by the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association.

New industrial insurance protection for the same period was \$12,917,000 and new group protection \$8,968,000.

The figures prepared by the Life Insurance Agency Management Association, are based on data supplied by companies doing more than 95% of the business in Canada.
