Rose Bush in Winter

Some of the hardest varieties of roses, such as briars, cabbage roses, Damask or Moss roses, need no winter protection. For hybrid

perpetual or hybrid tea roses some protection is necessary. In an open and exposed situation a good plan is to bend the plants down and cover them with soil. Where evergreen bough can be obtained put some of them over as well. A little soil

taken from one side of the bush will enable you to lay the bush flat down so that the whole of it may be covered. In less exposed situations a good plan is to tie the branches together and then tie some evergreen boughs, canvas or any material which will protect the bush from wind and sun. The material should be of such a nature that it will protect the plant, but at the same time not hold moisture that will mould the branches.

Do not prune the rose bushes till spring time. If they are pruned back to near the ground there will be few roses, though the individual flowers will be larger. If the branches are merely headed back, and the winter killed parts cut off, there will be a mass of roses. It is necessary also to remove some of the oldest wood each year, to make room for younger stems to develop.
